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VITA

Bernth Lindfors is currently professor of English and African literature at the University of Texas at Austin. He received his B.A. from Oberlin College, his A.M.T. from Harvard University, his M.A. from Northwestern University, and his Ph.D. from the University of California at Los Angeles. Academic honors awarded him include an NDEA Title VI fellowship, a Foreign Area fellowship, a National Endowment for the Humanities Younger Humanist fellowship, and a Social Science Research Council/American Council of Learned Societies fellowship for African studies.

Lindfors has written FOLKLORE IN NIGERIAN LITERATURE and has edited a number of books dealing with African oral and written literatures. He has also served as editor of the journal RESEARCH IN AFRICAN LITERATURES since its founding in 1970.

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INTRODUCTION

Black African literature in English is a relatively young field but it is growing rapidly. One sign of its vigor is the quantity of commentary it has attracted in recent years. When Barbara Abrash published her useful bibliography BLACK AFRICAN LITERATURE IN ENGLISH SINCE 1952: WORKS AND CRITICISM in 1967, she could list only 250 critical books and essays; this book lists more than 3,300. Although essays printed as early as 1936 have been included here, most of the additional titles have been published in the decade (1967–76) since Abrash's book appeared. And there is no evidence that interest in this new literature is beginning to wane. Indeed, each year that passes brings an increase in critical productivity. Black African literature in English appears to be well on its way toward emerging as an established academic discipline.

But before it can achieve widespread recognition as such, its critics and scholars will have to demonstrate greater responsibility in research and fuller awareness of the opinions of others. Too many books and essays are still being written on this literature as if nothing had been published on it before. Some of the same old ideas are being circulated again and again, and a few commentators are not bothering to check basic facts that are now easily accessible. To encourage more responsible scholarship, this bibliography attempts to list all the important works produced on black African literature in English up to the end of 1976.

However, due to limitations of space and time, certain materials have had to be omitted. Brief reviews of books and stage performances, political biographies of statesmen, and newspaper reports of the nonliterary activities of famous authors have been excluded, but not review articles or biographical materials possessing some literary significance. No creative works—novels, stories, plays, poems, anthologies—have been recorded unless prefaced by a substantial critical introduction. Bibliographies for creative titles are cited, however, under various genre and topical headings (bibliographies, fiction, drama, poetry and so forth) in part 1, and, wherever possible, under the appropriate individual author in part 11. The intention has been to provide comprehensive coverage of major scholarly books and periodicals as well as selective coverage of other relevant sources of informed commentary.

Introduction

I have made an effort to examine every item cited and have marked with an asterisk those not seen. A few inaccurate or possibly bogus references have been excluded because I have been unable to verify their existence. Since I intend to update this bibliography periodically, I would be extremely grateful to anyone who can provide me with full bibliographical details and a copy of any materials I may have omitted.

Annotations have been added to some entries, mostly to identify the authors with whom the article or book is primarily concerned. The general rule of thumb has been to list all authors who receive at least a page or two of commentary in a secondary source. If many authors are mentioned but none discussed at length, the annotation indicates that the work is a survey. "Et al" (and others) has been used whenever a work briefly treats additional authors not identified in the annotation or whenever the discussion includes African writers using French, Portuguese, or an indigenous language. In other words, annotations mention by name only those black African authors who write in English.

The bibliography is divided into two parts, the first organized by genre or topic, the second by individual author. An effort has been made to list each item in the bibliography only once and to provide numbered cross-references to it in all other sections in which the item belongs. Further, each section and subsection in the bibliography is followed by a "see also" listing of cross-references to additional relevant titles. An inventory of periodicals cited and four indexes—by name, title, subject, and geographical area—should also help users to locate and identify the references they need.

Some will recognize the bibliographical format employed here as a simplification of standard MLA practice. For instance, it may be assumed that the first number following a journal title is a volume or issue number; if there are two numbers following a journal title, the first is the volume number, the second the issue number.

Also, throughout the bibliography, alphabetization has been letter by letter, and diacritics have been treated as not alphabetically significant. When there are multiple references for a given author, or when the sources were published anonymously, the citations are listed in chronological order. English translations have been supplied for titles in all languages except French and German.
