Nicholas Bala, BA, LLB, LLM, is Professor of Law, Queen's University, Kingston, Ontario, Canada. He specializes in Family and Children's Law, including legal issues related to child abuse, domestic violence, youth offending and the definition of the family.

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Helene Berman, PhD, RN, is a faculty member at the University of Western Ontario, School of Nursing. Prior to pursuing a career in nursing, education, and research, she received a Bachelor's Degree in Anthropology from the University of Wisconsin. Donald G. Dutton received his PhD in Social Psychology from the University of Toronto. From 1979 to the present, he has served as a therapist in the Assaultive Husband's Project, a court-mandated treatment program for men convicted of wife assault. Dutton has served as an expert witness in civil trials involving domestic abuse and in criminal trials involving family violence, including his work for the prosecution in the O. J. Simpson trial. He is currently Professor of Psychology at the University of British Columbia.

Carole Echlin, BSW, MSW, is a Family Services Social Worker for the Children's Aid Society of London and Middlesex. She was recently seconded by the provincial government to assist in piloting a Child Welfare Competency Based Training Program for child welfare social workers. Her interest in woman abuse and the impact that it has on children dates back to the early 80s. Since then she has written about woman abuse, run numerous group programs for children, co-facilitated many workshops for professionals, and more recently helped design, along with Bina Osthoff (woman's advocate), a group program for women who have been mandated by the court to attend a woman abuse counselling program. This new project is a significant and important step in working collaboratively with women's advocates.

Jeffrey L. Edleson, PhD, is Professor of Social Work and Director of the Minnesota Center Against Violence and Abuse at the University of Minnesota. He is actively involved in international research, training, and technical assistance in the effort to end violence against women, and the author of numerous publications on family violence. He is also the Director of Research and Evaluation for the Domestic Abuse Project in Minneapolis.
