

使用说明

本丛书所选取的素材涉及国际政治、文化、经济、科技、文娱、体育及社会生活等 多个方面。内容丰富、选材新颖、具有时代感,为广大学生所喜闻乐见。本丛书还引进 了2006年高考的最新题型。

丛书的装订灵活别致:在页面的内侧打有一行针孔,便于撕取。既适合在老师指导下集体使用,也适合学生个别使用。本丛书的高一和高二4个分册,各有54篇阅读材料;高三2个分册各有14个单元,每单元有5篇阅读材料。在每篇材料的题目下方,印有空格供学生填写姓名、答案以及便于老师批改、评分。每篇材料后均标有"建议阅读时间",老师可利用课前几分钟让学生做此阅读练习。这样既能使老师及时了解学生的阅读水平,又节省时间;学生个人使用时也可根据"建议阅读时间"来测试自己阅读水平的提高情况。

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Plants "Cry Out" for Water

The world is covered with various living organisms. Humans use them for many of their needs. Our food comes directly and indirectly from plants. Minerals, vitamins and various types of oil are produced from plants. Even some of our clothing is made from plants, such as cotton, linen, etc. As we all know, plants can not talk, but do you know plants can "cry"?

Plant scientists say that some plants, deprived of water, make extremely faint clicking noises. These noises may one day be used to "tell" farmers when to water, and when to stop watering their crops.

The plant noises occur as a result of microscopic breaks in the plant's internal circulatory system. Water moves upward from the plant's root to the leaves through tubes called xylem(植物的木质部分) vessels.

In a drought, the plant's roots bring in very little water. As a result, air bubbles form inside the xylem vessels.

"The clicking noises," explains Dr. Mark Matthews, a plant scientist at the University of California at Davis, "apparently are tiny explosions within the plant's vessels." Dr. Matthews says the air bubbles inside the vessels expand and finally burst.

The popping sound is too high pitched(定音调) for humans to hear without special microphones. But scientists say insects can hear the noise.

Dr. Matthews believes that knowing more about these noises may help many farmers grow healthier plants. He says his studies of plant noises show that grapes used for wine making grow best when the grapes are just a bit "thirsty".

Health Gains Developing Countries

In recent years, the governments in developing countries have been making many efforts to improve people's living conditions. In 1960 the average life expectancy in these countries was 40 years. By 1990 life expectancy had risen to 60 years. Likewise, between 1960 and 1990, infant mortality(死亡率) had greatly decreased. In 1960, infant mortality was 200 deaths per 1000 births while in 1990 infant mortality had fallen to 100 deaths per 1000 births. That is to say, in thirty years, infant mortality decreased by 50%. These numbers show that great changes have taken place in health care in developing countries.

Why are the people in developing countries living longer than ever before? Mainly because governments in developing countries have taken effective measures to improve their people's living conditions and to provide better care for old people. Better standards of living and improved health care mean that more people are now living much longer. In developing countries, that means overpopulation has now become a serious problem. Some governments have been trying their best to control this with policies which limit families to one child. Some governments have also been investing more money in children's welfare and health.

In short, the improvement of people's living conditions and health has led to the rise of life expectancy and the fall of infant mortality.



A Trip by Balloon

On July 1, 1859, four men, abundantly supplied with provisions, started on a trip by balloon from St. Louis to New York. At 7:30, in the presence of thousands of

spectators, the cords that kept the balloon earthbound were cut, and with considerable velocity it ascended to the height of two miles. Taking an easterly direction, it passed, in the course of the night and much of the next day, over Lake Erie and Niagara Falls. As it neared Lake Ontario the balloon encountered a hurricane, lost its ascending power, and rapidly sank toward the water. The provisions and some of the passengers' clothing were tossed overboard. The balloon finally reached the shore, having traveled for 50 miles, just above the surface of the water. Here they were dragged over trees, hills and rocks, with their lives endangered every moment. Not one of them ever expected to reach the ground alive.

The whole distance traveled was 1,200 miles, and the time taken to accomplish the journey was 19 hours, averaging a mile a minute.

One of the passengers, Mr. Wise, is perfectly satisfied with the success of the experiment, and believes that the Atlantic Ocean can be crossed by balloon. It is his intention to attempt such a voyage to England in the near future. Should he do so, there are few persons optimistic(乐观的) enough to believe he will succeed in his venture.

Ship Wreck

One February day in 1948, a radio operator on a ship picked up an SOS message. The message said:

Then there was a pause for several hours until the next message came through. It said: "Now I am also near death." That was the last message from the ship.

The radio operator was able to decipher(破译) which ship had sent the message and where it was. He told his captain who then gave orders for his ship to race to the rescue(救援). The ship that had sent the SOS was a Dutch cargo ship, the Ourang Medan. It had been passing through the Malacca Strait on its way to Djakarta, Indonesia, at the time.

When the rescue ship reached the Ourang Medan, a rescue party climbed on board. They found all the ship's officers in the chartroom(海图室). They were all dead. It was as if they had been attending some kind of meeting with the captain and had suddenly been struck down. They all seemed to have died at about the same time. And all had their eyes wide open in horror at something they had seen just before they died. Some of them had arms pointing to the sky. Elsewhere, there were dead sailors all over the ship. They seemed to have died in the same way – suddenly, while looking at something horrific.

Before the bodies could be taken ashore(上岸) for a full examination, the Ourang Medan exploded(爆炸) and sank. The reason for their deaths is still unknown.

The Barbie Dolls

In the mid 1940's, the young ambitious duo Ruth and Elliot Handler, owned a company that made wooden picture frames. It was in 1945 that Ruth and Elliot

Handler joined with their close friend Harold Mattson to form a company that would be known for the most famous and successful doll ever created. This company would be named Mattel, MATT for Mattson, and EL for Elliot.

In the mid 1950's while visiting Switzerland, Ruth Handler purchased a German Lilli doll. Lilli was a shapely, pretty fashion doll first made in 1955. She was originally fashioned after a famous cartoon character in the west German Newsletter, Build.

Lilli is the doll that would inspire Ruth Handler to design the Barbie doll. With the help of her technicians and engineers at Mattel, Barbie was born. Ruth then hired Charlotte Johnson, a fashion designer, to create Barbie's wardrobe. It was in 1958 that the patent for Barbie was obtained. This would be a fashion doll unlike any of her time. She would be long limbed, shapely and beautiful, all of this only 11.5 foot tall. Ruth and Elliot would name their new fashion doll after their own daughter, Barbie.

In 1959, Barbie doll would make her way to the New York Toy Show and receive a cool reception from the toy buyers.

Barbie has undergone a lot of changes over the years and has managed to keep up with current trends in hairstyles, makeup and clothing. She is a reflection of the history of fashion since her introduction to the toy market.

Barbie has a universal appeal and collectors both young and old enjoy time spent and memories made with their dolls.
