for the US presidency, the fact that he was divorced was considered a major reason for his defeats. By the time Ronald Reagan and his second wife, Nancy, came to <u>10</u> the White House in 1981, the bad <u>11</u> of divorce, at least in political life, had greatly <u>12</u>.

Social scientists believe that increasing life <u>13</u> has had a negative effect on the <u>14</u> of some marriages. Staying with one person was easier when adults died at 45 or 50. People live longer today and <u>15</u> medical breakthroughs, better nutrition, and cosmetic surgery, they feel <u>16</u> and look younger at more <u>17</u> ages. Many social observers say that one divorce is not taboo (socially unacceptable) and two is no longer <u>18</u>.

"A third marriage makes a lot of people nervous, and definitely a fourth 19," says Nancy Etcoff, who teaches psychology at Harvard Medical School.

But, those who marry repeatedly are always hopeful. "No one would ever get married with plans to get divorced. These people are extremely <u>20</u>. They value love and romance and they want to get it right. Every time they marry, they want it to last forever," says Etcoff.
