# INTRODUCTION TO INVENTORY OF MARRIAGE AND FAMILY LITERATURE

DAVID H. OLSON

## OVERVIEW OF VOLUME VI

The mushrooming interest in research and theorizing about marital and family relationships is reflected in the growing number of professional journals and journal articles published in this field. Volume VI contains 3,963 articles by approximately 8,000 authors, which were published in 650 journals.

As with the past five volumes, the current Inventory provides an interdisciplinary and nonevaluative collection of the published marriage and family literature. Because of the increasing interest in topics related to this field, the decision was made to now produce a volume every year. Volume I covers the years 1900 to 1964; Volume II, 1965 to 1972; Volume III, 1973 and 1974; Volume IV, 1975 and 1976; Volume V, 1977 and 1978; and Volume VI covers 1979. Volume VI, like Volumes III, IV, and V, was modified and expanded from the first two volumes. First, they provide a biennial listing of all relevant articles, not restricted to research or theory articles, published in professional journals. Also, all of the articles published in the leading marriage and family journals were indexed in this volume. These included the following journals: *JOURNAL OF MARRIAGE AND THE FAMILY*, *FAMILY COORDINATOR*, *FAMILY PROCESS*, and *JOURNAL OF MARRIAGE AND FAMILY THERAPY*.

The coverage of the articles in Volumes III, IV, V, and VI was restricted to those published in English, which included a variety of foreign journals. This was necessary because of the growing number of articles in English and because of the increasing difficulty and cost of obtaining and translating the articles published in other languages.

The three indexing systems in this volume, (AUTHOR INDEX, SUBJECT INDEX, and KEY WORD IN TITLE [KWIT] INDEX) have been improved for easier use and clarity. Authors' addresses have also been added so that is easier to obtain reprints of these articles.

## MUSHROOMING VOLUME OF MARRIAGE AND FAMILY LITERATURE

With the completion of Volume VI, there are now almost 33,000 marriage and family articles compiled in this Inventory System that were drawn from approximately 650 professional journals (Table 1). This represents more than a 200% increase in the number of publications since 1964, the last year covered by Volume I of the Inventory. There was also a 250% increase in the number of articles published as compared with the years 1970-1978.

Unfortunately, it is not possible to assess the actual number of articles published during 1979 because of excessive publication delays by many journals. With our December 1979 cutoff date for this publication, many journals have not yet mailed out their winter editions. In fact, we have observed that many journals publish a few months after the date listed on their covers, and some journals are delayed as much as six months.

More than 650 different journals published one or more articles in the marriage and family field during the year 1979 covered in Volume VI. This represents a 60% increase in the number of journals containing one or more articles in 1973-1974. The 15 journals which published 30 or more articles during 1979 are listed in Table 2. Two of the National Council on Family Relations (NCFR) publications (FAMILY COORDINATOR and JOURNAL OF MARRIAGE AND THE FAMILY) contained the most family articles (n = 275; 7%).

The value of the Inventory becomes apparent when one realizes the number of different journals that would have to be purchased to obtain only a small proportion of the articles published during a given year. More specifically, while 15 journals published 809 of the articles in Volume VI, they still only accounted for about 20% of the articles in this volume. It would take subscriptions to 60 journals to even obtain one-half of the 3,963 articles in Volume VI.

The authorship of the 3,963 articles is shown in Table 3. A total of 7,887 persons had single or multiple authorship of these articles. Almost half the articles were written by one person, and another quarter were written by two coauthors.

Only a quarter of the publications contained more than two authors. About 80% of the authors only had one article in the current Inventory, 10% completed two articles, and only 10% had more than two articles. In conclusion, it appears that the vast majority of the articles are written by one or two authors, and each writer published either one or two articles in this field during 1979.

### TRENDS IN TOPICS AND CONCEPTS

In order to assess the trends occurring in regard to various topics in the marriage and family literature, the number of listings for each of the 11 general subject matter categories used in the Inventory system was calculated. Each article was read and categorized, and the average number of categories used was 1.2 per article.

The three most popular categories, which accounted for about 60% of all the listings, was *Family as a Small Group* (20%), *Organizations and Services to Families* (19%), and *Families with Special Problems* (18%). The percentage of publications in these areas remained rather constant over the years. *Family as a Small Group* consisted of articles relating to such topics as husband-wife relationships, parent-child relationships, family life cycle stages, and studies of decision-making. *Organizations and Services to Families* consisted of articles relating the family to government, religion, education, social services, and health services. *Families with Special Problems* involved issues like child abuse, drug abuse, mental illness, juvenile delinquency, separation and divorce, death, and other forms of family disorganization.

The only other two general areas that accounted for about 10% of the literature were *Counseling and Education* and *Trends and Change in Marriage and Family*. Interest in the applied fields, which includes marital and family therapy, family life and sex education, and families with special problems have made the greatest gain of any of the general categories in the last decade.

Two areas have continued to have decline in interest over the history of the Inventory. Interest in the area of *Marriage and Divorce* statistics has also dropped from a high of 12% in Volume I to about 4% in Volume VI. *Mate Selection*, which includes articles on dating and courtship topics, is now the least popular topic, with only about 1% of the papers dealing with this issue.

Another way of assessing trends in the marriage and family literature is to look at the key words listed in the titles of articles (KWIT INDEX). This assumes that the authors were careful in selecting the relevant concepts and chose to list them in the title. Although this is not the most accurate way of assessing trends, it does give a rough estimate of what concepts are most frequently used by authors. Table 5 shows the 24 terms that were listed 50 or more times in the Key Word in Title (KWIT) Index, excluding common terms like marriage, family, and child.

By far the most frequently used concept was *sex*, which was listed in the KWIT Index 304 times. The concepts which were used more than 100 times in the titles of articles were: sex (304), women (156), therapy (153), role (124), mother(s) (122), abuse (115), and adolescent (104).

Clustering concepts from this initial list, we find that there are almost six times the number of concepts related to women (400) as to men (72). More specifically, the 400 female-oriented concepts included the following: women (156), mother (122), wife (50), and female (72). On the other hand, there were only 72 male-oriented terms: fathering (72). *Therapy* was also a very large category with 285 concepts related to it: therapist (153), treatment (72), and counselor (60).

It appears that the marriage and family literature reviewed in Volume VI of the Inventory gives considerable attention to sex, women, and therapy. These three concepts were also the ones to appear most frequently in Volumes IV and V of the Inventory. It appears, therefore, that this field continues to emphasize issues related to these three domains, and it clearly reflects the *Zeitgeist* in the marriage and family field.

## HOW TO USE THE INVENTORY

The Inventory is divided into three Indexes, and they are listed in the following order: a *Subject Index*, an *Author Index*, and the *Key Word in Title Index* (KWIT).

The *Subject Index* organizes the articles into one or more of the 11 general and 91 specific categories. On the average, an article is listed in 1.2 of the specific categories. These general and specific categories are indicated in Table 6. The author(s), title, and complete reference are indicated for each article in the Subject Index.

The *Author Index* lists the articles in alphabetical order according to the author(s). Coauthored articles are listed separately for each author. Also included in this index is the first author's current mailing address, which is often different from the one which appeared on the actual article. While most of the addresses listed are current, the change symbol (/) is used to indicate an address was updated. Articles with multiple authors have the address of the first author. When the coauthor's address was available, this was indicated by the symbol c/o. Some names may appear with the same initials. For best results, reprints should be ordered from the exact address given under the specific article. The mailing address will enable the reader to write directly to the author for reprints and for more details regarding the author's work.

The third index is the *Key Word in Title* (KWIT) *Index*. This system selects key words in the title and omits primarily prepositions and conjunctions. For example, an article entitled "*Drug Addicted Parents and Child Abuse*" would be listed three times, under the key words of *drug*, *addicted*, and *abuse*. The key word is listed on the lefthand side of the

page and the remaining part of the title is listed following the key word. The righthand column indicates the first author and the year of publication. The entire citation can be located in the Author Index. Because the computer does not have all the usual punctuation marks, other symbols have been substituted, and these are indicated in Table 7.

Readers, therefore, have three different index systems which they can use if they want to locate particular articles. If one or more of the authors is known, it is most efficient to go directly to the Author Index. If a reader is concerned with a given topic area, the Subject Index would provide a rather detailed listing of articles in 91 different content areas. The KWIT Index enables a reader to locate articles related to a specific concept, such as abortion, alcohol, therapy, or sex. After locating a few relevant references, the reader can then locate the specific reference in the Author Index, and can also check the Subject Index for additional related articles.
