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

Preface



Welcome to the 7th edition of *The Language of Medicine*! This edition is about continuity. It has been twenty-eight years since the first edition was published, and I continue to find satisfaction in teaching and writing about medical terminology. You, as students and teachers, continue to motivate me with your valuable suggestions and comments. Because of the ease of communication via email, you have made a big difference in this edition. Thank you for writing to me and contributing to the success of this book throughout the years.

More than ever, this new edition reflects your continuing interest in the clinical relevance of medical terminology. Thus, I have added more case scenarios to illustrate how medical terms are used in sentences and up-to-date information about disease processes and new procedures. Plus, you will find additional full color illustrations and photographs that enhance your ability to see medical terms in action. Clearly, the best way to study medical terms is to understand them in their proper context, which is the anatomy, physiology, and pathology of the human body.

In addition to valuable reviews and continual feedback from instructors, medical reviewers have provided insight and advice about relevant and important medical terminology. My daughter, Elizabeth Chabner Thompson, MD, MPH, also contributed medical vignettes to each chapter and meticulously examined each chapter for clarity, simplicity, and practicality. Throughout, *The Language of Medicine* emphasizes explaining terminology rather than rote memorization of terms.*

^{*}Continuing in this edition is the omission of the possessive form of all eponyms (e.g. Down syndrome, Tourette syndrome, Alzheimer disease). While the possessive form remains acceptable, this text is responding to a growing trend in promoting consistency and clarity. This decision is supported by The American Association for Medical Transcription in their Manual of Style (2002) and the American Medical Association in their Manual of Style, 10th edition (Williams and Wilkins), as well as by major medical dictionaries.

The fundamental features you have come to trust in learning and teaching medical terminology remain unchanged in this new 7th edition. These are:

- Simple, nontechnical explanations of medical terms.
- Workbook format with ample spaces to write answers.
- Explanations of clinical procedures, laboratory tests, and abbreviations related to each body system.
- Pronunciation of terms with phonetic spellings and spaces to write meanings of terms.
- Practical Applications sections with case reports, operative and diagnostic tests, and laboratory and x-ray reports.
- Exercises that test your understanding of terminology as you work through the text step-by-step (answers are included).
- Review sheets that pull together terminology to help you study.
- Comprehensive glossaries and appendices for reference in class and on the job. NEW to this edition is a Drug Appendix that alphabetically lists drugs and their uses.

The CD-ROM included with this new edition is packed with additional information, images, and video clips to test and expand your understanding. Chapter by chapter, I have added more case studies, examples of medical records, and a wealth of new images to illustrate terminology. Additionally, on the CD-ROM, you can hear me pronounce the relevant terms on the pronunciation of terms section in every chapter (more than 3,000 terms in all!). A useful CD-ROM glossary helps you analyze and divide terms into their individual word parts.

My Medical Language Instant Translator (for sale separately) is a uniquely useful resource for all allied health professionals and students of medical terminology and has been updated for this new edition. It is a pocket-sized medical terminology reference with convenient information at your fingertips! Included are:

- Explanations of common office and hospital procedures and laboratory tests.
- Abbreviations, acronyms, and symbols.
- Frequently prescribed drugs and their uses.
- Glossaries to help you decipher medical terms without consulting a dictionary.
- Medical terms that are commonly confused.
- Full-color illustrations of body systems.
- Surgical terminology, including instrumentation and procedures.

The Language of Medicine Instructor's Curriculum Resource (including an instructor's manual, CD-ROM with test bank, and image collection) is available with even more new quizzes, teaching suggestions, crossword puzzles, medical reports, and reference material. The image collection contains all figures and photos from this new 7th edition.

My continued goal in writing The Language of *Medicine* is to help students learn and to help instructors teach. Using an interactive, logical, interesting, and easy-to-follow method, you will find that medical terminology comes "alive" and stays with you. Undeniably, the study of this language requires commitment and hard work, but the benefits are great. The knowledge that you gain will jump start your career in the medical workplace and help you for years to come.





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
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
