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Introduction

A few years only have elapsed between the first and the second Congress of Group Psychotherapy.

A survey of the activity of the many research workers dealing with the problems which present themselves in that field makes it abundantly clear that group psychotherapy has, in the meantime, gained considerably in importance in clinical practice and that it has become an essential complement of individual psychotherapy.

The Second International Congress in Zurich represents an important event in the life of that young branch of therapeutical practice. The papers read by well-known representatives of the various therapeutical orientations have shown to what extent group psychotherapy has found a place in the practice of almost all "schools", a development which has provided new evidence of the wide scope of its range of application and of its general viability.

We believe therefore that by publishing the report of the activities of that Congress we shall stimulate the general interest taken in group psychotherapy.

We wish to conclude by expressing our sincere thanks to the Chairman of the International Society for Group Psychotherapy, Dr. W. J. Warner for the help he has kindly given us.

Nur wenige Jahre liegen zwischen dem ersten und dem zweiten Kongreß für Gruppenpsychotherapie.

The First International Congress of Group Psychotherapy

The First International Congress of Group Psychotherapy was held in Toronto, Canada, August 12-20, 1954, in association with the Fifth International Congress of Mental Health. Registration numbered over three hundred with representatives from Europe, South and Central America, and Asia. Six panel sessions provided for twenty papers, in addition to two forum sessions. At the close of the Congress a capacity banquet was attended not only by the registrants of the Congress of Group Psychotherapy but also officers and members of the Fifth International Congress of Mental Health and the International Institute of Child Psychiatry as guests. The leadership of the Congress of Group Psychotherapy was greatly heartened by this cooperation and the expression of confidence and support by the other two international congresses.

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Opening Address

By WELLMAN J. WARNER, New York, N.Y.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

There is more than passing significance in this brief ceremony designed to open a series of meetings. It is only three years since, in 1954, a few leaders ventured to think that the time had arrived to recognize a set of new ideas. They were really old ideas which in the competition of the market place and the priorities of the classroom had been overlooked. The urgencies of the moment and the historical accidents of origins were to tie psychotherapy to the organism when the group forces of behavior had made few claims for a legitimate domain.

By 1954, the picture had begun to change. Of course, from time immemorial men had used forces of the group in practices which were therapeutic. But only for a generation had the formal pioneers experimented with what was implicit but unlabeled in individual psychotherapy. Developments led rapidly both to better understanding and the formulation of procedures. This was no isolated phenomenon. In many countries exploration was going forward. Even so, the men who set up in Toronto the First International Congress of Group Psychotherapy could not be sure that the time was ripe for the movement to crystallize on an international level.

But the result was a confirmation that the time for extended communication and international organization was ripe. The number of persons who traveled from all over the world to Toronto exceeded expectations. As a result of that Congress, there was organized an International Committee for Group Psychotherapy, composed of twenty-one persons from ten countries. They were charged with the responsibility of nurturing the collaboration of workers in this field across national lines, to plan for the next international congress, and to prepare the way for the formation of an international organization.

This the International Committee has done. From the first of its meetings in Toronto, the Committee has followed two principles in approaching its task. First, it has recognized the wide variety of practice and ideas represented in the work of men and women in many places and situations in the different countries. It has sought to avoid any rigid limits of theory which would discourage collaboration or set up prematurely any dogmatic standards by which orthodoxy was to be measured. Second, in a development of such crucial importance, it has recognized that the field needs and should encourage the participation of all competent professional interests, including not only those who are engaged in the practice but also those who are concerned with the scientific study of the problems of group psychotherapy.

The long-range agency which the International Committee envisages, is a permanent organization in which both the national organizations of group psychotherapy and individual workers in the area will participate in the development of methods and the accumulation of knowledge which will give added substance to our field of action.

It is in that commitment that my colleagues of the Executive Committee and the International Committee of Group Psychotherapy have commissioned me to welcome you and to hereby declare open the Second International Congress of Group Psychotherapy.
