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## 出-版-说-明

随着新《英语课程标准》(以下简称《新课标》)的颁布,中学英语教学改革推进到了一个新的阶段,对学生的知识面、交际能力、文化意识等方面的要求提到了新的高度。课外阅读不再是课堂教学可有可无的补充,而已成为英语学习不可或缺的部分。《新课标》对学生课外阅读在数量上作出了明确的规定,在培养目标上提出了一系列新的要求。为此,上海外语教育出版社与朗文合作编写了这套“外教社·朗文中学英语分级阅读:新课标百科丛书”。其目的是将《新课标》的教学理念贯彻到课外阅读当中,帮助学生达到《新课标》所提出的各项要求。

丛书的编写以《新课标》为指导,主要有以下特点: 1. 在总体设计上,根据《新课标》分级编写,针对性强,充分满足各阶段中学生的阅读需求; 2. 在选材上,突出个性化特征,根据不同年龄段学生的不同阅读兴趣,选择具有时代感、内容丰富的题材,帮助学生在完成《新课标》阅读任务的同时,扩大知识面,培养跨文化交流意识; 3. 在难度的把握上,兼顾能力的提高和阅读兴趣及自信心的培养,为学生营造宽松的学习氛围; 4. 在学习策略的指导上,根据《新课标》对各级的要求为每册书编写阅读技巧指南,引导学生养成良好的学习习惯; 5. 在单元后的练习编排上,突出灵活性、开放性及参与性,将读、说、写等相结合,激发学生的想象力和创造力,帮助学生全面达到《新课标》的各项要求。

丛书共80册,分3、5、7、9四级,每级各20册。本丛书与“外教社·朗文小学英语分级阅读”一脉相承,是外教社与朗文合作推出的阅读精品。

作为以《新课标》为指导编写课外阅读的积极尝试,我们衷心希望广大读者能够多与我们联系、沟通,提出宝贵的意见和建议,协助我们精益求精,将丛书不断提高、完善。





### The first World Expo

The history of World Expos started in the mid-19th century in Britain. At that time, Britain was the leader of the Industrial Revolution. Many British people felt that it was important to show their achievements to the world. Prince Albert (1819–1861), Queen Victoria's (1819–1901) husband, supported the idea. He worked hard to organise the world's very first Expo.






On 1 May 1851, the London World Expo opened in Hyde Park. In many ways, the first World Expo was a great success. Thirty-two countries participated and showed their best goods and inventions. More than six million people came to visit. Britain made a lot of money out of this Expo.

## BIE



After the first World Expo in London, there were several other successful Expos. As a result, every country wanted to have one. Finally, an international organisation was formed in Paris in 1928. It is called Bureau International des Expositions (BIE) in French. In English, it means International Exhibitions Bureau.

The organisation set rules for World Expos. For example, an Expo should last six months and Expos should be held every five years.

BIE now decides which city should host each Expo. In 2002, it decided that Shanghai should host the 2010 World Expo.






