## Introduction

In the 3 years that have elapsed since the last edition of the *Technical Manual*, there has been change, but more importantly, an adjustment to change. We are experiencing an enhanced awareness of our need to develop programs that will enable us to monitor performance in terms of the expectations of our users. These new programs in quality assessment and the application of continuous improvement should result in better patient care and increased safety for our patients and donors. Emphasis continues on more careful donor screening and better laboratory tests to detect disease markers in donor blood. Relevance and streamlining in red cell serology are increasingly evident as Laboratory Information Systems are becoming more widely used to store information, track components/bone/tissues and assist the user to meet the complex requirements that exist today in blood centers and hospital transfusion services.

Transfusion practice is dynamic and is being modified as new information and methods become available. This edition of the *Technical Manual*, the 11th, contains the same chapters found in the 10th edition. However, the material has been extensively updated and revised, and some sections have been rewritten. Any edition of the *Technical Manual* is a snapshot in time of this evolving theory and practice. The editors, contributors and reviewers have attempted to capture this snapshot, as reflected by the 15th edition of *Standards for Blood Banks and Transfusion Services* in the Spring of 1993.

The editors are especially grateful to all of the contributors and reviewers of this edition for their assistance. Their comments, suggestions and critiques have been most valuable and greatly appreciated. The review process has strengthened the value of this book.
