TERRY There's a mouse. Catch it quickly!

WALTER A mouse?

TERRY Over there! It's gone. Yes, well . . .

WALTER Have you all given your names to the operator?


Good. They will soon be ready. Now come with
me, and you will see the printing-presses. Look
up there, and you will see the paper run over the
cylinders. The cylinders print the words on print the words on the paper. . . . Terry!

TERRY I saw that mouse again.

WALTER Again?

TERRY It was sitting there on that table. I saw it move!

WALTER You can watch the paper go from this roll, up to
the top of the machine, and at this end of the
machine. . . .



You can watch the paper go from this toll up to the top of the machine

(Terry sees what he thinks is the mouse's tail, but he picks up a piece of string. Walter continues to talk to the girls)

WALTER Here you can watch the roll of paper going through the printing-press. And at the other end you have a printed newspaper.

BARBARA I see. This machine has printed it, and cut it, and

folded it.

WALTER That's right. You can see the paper going through the press in one piece.

(Terry sees the mouse again)

TERRY There it is!

(But the mouse has gone)

TERRY I'm sorry, Walter.

(He suddenly looks at the schoolmistress)

SCHOOLMISTRESS What's the matter?

TERRY I want to look at your hat.

SCHOOLMISTRESS My hat?

TERRY Keep still. It's gone!

SCHOOLMISTRESS Gone? My hat has gone?

TERRY I'm sorry. Please forgive me. I thought I saw a mouse moving.

SCHOOLMISTRESS A mouse? I haven't got a mouse.

TERRY No, I can see you haven't.

WALTER You're not well, Terry. You ought to sit down for a minute. Go back to the office. Ah, now let's go on to the next machine.

(Miss Brown, the secretary, comes in)

MISS BROWN Oh, Mr. Jones. Mr. Wilson wants your story about the opening of the new shopping centre by —

(Miss Brown sees the mouse on Terry's shoulder. She screams and faints)

WALTER Miss Brown, Miss Brown!

TERRY She can't hear you.

WALTER This is terrible. What happened to make her faint like that?

TERRY Look! She moved her eyes.

WALTER Miss Brown, are you all right?

MISS BROWN Where am I? What happened?

WALTER You fainted.

MISS BROWN Fainted? Oh, no! Has it gone?

SCHOOLMISTRESS Gone?

MISS BROWN The mouse. I saw a mouse!

TERRY You did? So you saw the mouse, too.

MISS BROWN It was on your shoulder.

TERRY You see? There was a mouse. I didn't imagine it.

MISS BROWN Oh, please. Don't talk about them. I'm frightened of them.

TERRY Frightened? Of a mouse? They can't hurt you.

SCHOOLMISTRESS My girls are waiting for me. I must go. Their tour is over now. Shall I go with you to your office, Miss Brown?

MISS BROWN Yes, please.

WALTER It's very kind of you to help. Thank you. So there was a mouse. We must find a cat.

TERRY We have a cat at home. I'll bring it tomorrow. (There is a tap on the door)

WALTER Come in!

BARBARA Mr. Jones, may I have my mouse now, please?

WALTER Another mouse?

BARBARA No, it's the same one. It's a pet mouse, you see.

And it was frightened when Miss Brown fainted.

WALTER But I haven't got it.

BARBARA It went into your pocket. This pocket.

TERRY You mean it was yours? Really!



1. Noun with infinitive

I saw the mouse move

After the verbs see, hear, feel, watch, notice, we can use a noun or pronoun followed by an infinitive:

We heard the boy shout

You will see the paper run over the cylinders

You can watch the paper go into the machine

They watched it complete the line of type

I noticed the mouse move

I heard it squeak

2. Noun with -ing form of the verb

I saw the mouse moving

After the noun mouse comes the -ing form of the verb, the present participle.

I saw him crossing the road (this means he was on the way to the other

side)

Compare this with:

I saw him cross the road (from one side to another)

The -ing form crossing, the present participle, describes the action in progress. The infinitive cross describes the complete act.

You can watch the roll of paper going into the printing-press

You can see the paper going through the press

I noticed it moving over there

We can use the verbs feel, hear, listen to, look at, notice, see, smell and watch in this way.

The 'Tune of the Day'

There it is!

I see!

Please forgive me!

Exercise 1
