Fanny Kemble creates the role of Julia in Sheridan Knowles's The Hunchback. 15 March – Francis the First premiered at Covent Garden. 22 June – Fanny Kemble takes leave of the Covent Garden stage; 1 August – Fanny and Charles Kemble (stepping down as manager of Covent Garden), along with Adelaide De Camp, sail for New York. In September Charles and Fanny make their American debuts at the Park Theatre, New York (Fanny's debut 18 September); October – in Philadelphia, Fanny Kemble meets Pierce Butler for the first time

Anna Cora Ogden meets James Mowatt (some fourteen years her elder)

On her first visit to the theatre, late 1833 or early 1834, Anna Cora Ogden sees Fanny Kemble at the Park Theatre in Knowles's *The Hunchback* 

1834 April – death of Adelaide De Camp. 7 June – Fanny
Kemble marries Pierce Butler in Philadelphia
6 October – at the age of 15 Anna Cora Ogden marries
James Mowatt secretly in New York
Spring – the Mowatts move to Flatbush, Long Island

I November – Fanny Kemble Butler sails from New
York bound for London
