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Introduction


Crazy Idioms is a very basic, short course on idioms that's a lot of fun and can be learned in a few weeks. Because it's easier to remember idioms that have something in common, the forty-five idioms in Crazy Idioms are divided into the following categories: Animal Idioms, Food Idioms, Color Idioms, Body Idioms, and Dangerous Idioms (idioms with double meanings).

The exercises are simple and fun. Each unit ends with a "Use What You Learned" section that gives students practice in using the idioms in semifree conversation. Everyone in the class gets up from his or her seat. Then students are told to find someone who, for example, "eats like a bird." They must ask everyone in the class "Do you eat like a bird?" until they find someone who says "Yes." That person signs his or her name in the space provided. There are several questions of this type, and it's expected that students will do each question at a different pace so that the atmosphere in the classroom becomes like a party. The teacher is free to walk around the classroom and supervise those who need it.

You eat like a bird.


Juan: I'm chicken. It's been in the refrigerator for six weeks. I

Kim: I like the young one. He's really foxy.


Andre: But he eats like a pig.
