There are three routes and two modes of study leading to the same award. 5416 and 5425 accept applicants holding a Diploma in Social Work with a minimum of 2 years social work experience. 5432 accepts applicants holding A-Level qualifications.

2. MINIMUM ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

- 2.1 For 5416 and 5425, applicants must possess the following:-
 - (a) Diploma in Social Work awarded by the Hong Kong Polytechnic or an equivalent qualification, and
 - (b) A minimum of 2 years' relevant social work experience after completion of (a) above.

Applicants will normally be expected to have achieved at least a credit level in their first social work qualification.

- 2.2 For 5432 applicants must possess the following:-
 - (a) Grade E or above in 2 subjects in Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination (HKALE) which can be attained at multiple settings; AND
 - (b) Grade E or above in five subjects in Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination (HKCEE); AND
 - (c) Grade E or above in the Use of English Examination; AND
 - (d) Grade E or above in Chinese Language or in another language other than English in HKCEE.

3. COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 3.1 The objectives of the Course are to enable the students:-
 - (a) to deepen conceptual understanding of the nature of social work;
 - (b) to enhance direct practice competence for effective functioning in the various roles of social workers facing increasingly complex social problems;
 - (c) to expand knowledge and develop critical understanding of the social sciences as a foundation to inform social work study and practice;
 - (d) to study social issues and problems from a wide perspective, drawing on a range of theoretical and methodological approaches;

- (e) to develop basic understanding of, and beginning skills in, supervision, management, planning, and research in social work;
- (f) to develop learning competence in using flexibly and creatively information, knowledge, theories, and resources for on-going improvement of professional practice.
- 3.2 In particular, the first year of the 3-years Course 5432 for A- Level Entrants is a "Foundation Year" which prepares students for the subsequent 2 years of study in the BSW (Hons) Course. The theme of the "Foundation Year" is "on becoming a social worker", i.e. to provide the students with attitudes, knowledge and competencies necessary for becoming a beginning professional social worker. The specific objectives of the "Foundation Year" include:-
 - (a) to broaden the intellectual outlook and theoretical perspectives of students and to develop a holistic conception of human existance;
 - (b) to begin to cultivate and develop among the students values and attitudes commensurate with professional social work practice;
 - (c) to begin to develop among the students an understanding of the contextual reality of social work practice;
 - (d) to provide students with a basic understanding of the essential ingredients of professional social work practice;
 - to provide actual and simulated field experience for students and to develop beginning competence in social work practice;
 - (f) to begin to develop among the students learning orientations typical of active learners and reflective practitioners.

An Induction Workshop will be held during the first week of Term I, Year I. The Induction Workshop will be non-assessed.

5.3 For Course 5425:

As the Part Time mode is an alternate way to attain the Degree of Bachelor of Social Work, the Part Time programme will be on parity with that of the Full Time. In other words, the course content of the two courses will be the same.

In the second year the students will be on fieldwork for two full days each week for a total of 30 weeks.

Not including Personal Tutorial (8 hours during each year). Personal Tutorial is non-assessed.

The normal practice will be for the student to attend classes two evenings and one Saturday morning each week during the first three years of the programme. During the fourth year, the student will devote two full days (16 hours) to Fieldwork, for 30 weeks, and attend classes one evening per week. In exceptional cases, students may be allowed to take block placements whereby they will devote five days (40 hours) to Fieldwork, for 12 weeks, and attend classes one evening per week.

- In the fourth year, the students will be on fieldwork for two full days each week for a total of 30 weeks.
- Not including Personal Tutorial (4 hours during each year). Personal Tutorial is non-assessed.

6. CRITERIA FOR ASSESSMENT, PROGRESSION AND AWARD

(complemented by the Hong Kong Polytechnic General Assessment Regulations and to be amended when the need arises. Students will be advised of the changes.)

6.1 The Assessment System

The assessment system for the degree course is a combination of CONTINUOUS ASSESSMENT and EXAMINATION. The assessment criteria, while varying according to the different components, aim to provide the students with as many opportunities as possible to demonstrate their competence.

6.2 Board of Examiners

6.2.1 Functions

The Board of Examiners is responsible to the Academic Board for making an overall assessment of each student's performance, for making a decision on the progression of each student at each intermediate stage of the Course, and for making a decision on the award to be granted to each student at the end of the Course.

6.2.2 Composition

The Board of Examiners shall have the following composition:

Chairman: Head of Department of Applied Social Studies

Members: (a) The Senior Course Tutor.

- (b) Course Co-ordinators of each mode of the programme.
- (c) Internal Examiners of the course all members of staff with assigned responsibility for the assessment of those components of the course on which the Board of Examiners is taking decisions.
- (d) The External Examiners.
- (e) The extra-departmental examiner, a senior member of staff from another department.
- (f) The Departmental Examinations Officer.

Secretary: The Academic Secretary, or his/her representative.

Assistant Secretary: Administrative Officer / Administrative
Assistant of the Department of Applied Social
Studies.

The Associate Director (Academic) and the Chairman of the Divisional Board shall have the right to attend and speak at meetings of the Board, and to receive documents if they so wish.

6.2.3 Quorum

The Board of Examiners shall be quorate if sufficient internal examiners are present to represent 75% of the subject matter of the year being considered.

6.3 Attendance

6.3.1 There is no attendance requirement for academic subjects. For a fieldwork placement, attendance should be 100%. In the event that fieldwork days are missed for any reason, these will normally need to be made up at a later date.

6.4 Marks and Grades

6.4.1 The assessment of a student's performance in an academic subject and in fieldwork will be by means of a percentage mark or a grade, and will be related to the final classification as set out in the following:

6.5 Assessment of Academic Subjects

- 6.5.1 An academic subject will be assessed by one or a combination of the following methods:
 - (a) continuous assessment
- (b) written examination
 - 6.5.2 Continuous assessment may be in the form of tests, quizzes, seminar presentations, assignments, laboratory work and projects.
- 6.5.3 The percentages allocated to each area of assessment will be specified in the subject syllabuses. An overall list concerning such allocations is provided in Appendix I.
- 6.5.4 Each area of assessment should not be less than 40%.
 - 6.5.5 The aggregate passing mark for each subject should be 50%.
- 6.5.6 A student who has obtained less than 50% of the total possible marks in subjects where there is no examination but only continuous assessment, may be required by the Board of Examiners to undertake remedial work. Failure to do so may result in failure of the subject.

6.6 Re-assessments

- 6.6.1 A re-assessment is intended to provide an opportunity for a student to remedy an identified weakness after a short period of further study. It will be used sparingly and will only be decided upon when the Board of Examiners has evidence that the student has the ability to proceed further on the course.
- 6.6.2 A student may be re-assessed in a failed subject provided that he:
 - shall not be re-assessed in more than two subjects in each year of study;
 - ii) shall not be re-assessed in a subject more than once other than when the subject is repeated;
 - iii) is not a final year student;
 - iv) failed the subject under clear extenuating circumstances, such as ill health.
 - 6.6.3 The Board of Examiners shall decide on the form of the re-assessment (e.g. written examination, viva voce, assignment), taking cognizance of the nature of the failed subject concerned and the nature of the failure.
 - 6.6.4 All re-assessments should take place before the commencement of the next stage of the course, but should be late enough to allow the students sufficient time to prepare themselves.
 - 6.6.5 A student who is re-assessed for a subject failure, where there are no clear extenuating circumstances (see 6.6.7 below), shall be awarded the minimum subject pass mark or grade on passing the re-assessment.
 - 6.6.6 A student who is re-assessed for reasons other than a straight forward academic failure, e.g. ill health, may, at the discretion of the Board of Examiners, be awarded the actual mark or grade obtained in the re-assessment.
 - 6.6.7 A student who has been absent from an assessment through illness or other good cause may be permitted, subject to the approval of the Chairman of the Board of Examiners, to be assessed as if for the first time.
