





North America

A New York City

New York City[®] is located at the mouth of the Hudson River, southeastern New York State, and northeastern United States. It isn't the capital of New York State, but residents of the "Big Apple" compensate[®] for that fact by considering their city the capital of the globe. There's good case to be made: New York is the home of the United Nations and a surprisingly diverse population, as well as the largest investment market in the world.

Depending on one's point of view, New York City is any one of four cities: To social scientists, it is a laboratory in which to study the challenges of urban life, from horrible slum ³ to tycoon ⁴ luxury; To tourists it is a city of

jostling crowds, horn-honking traffic jams, dirty streets, smelly subways — all in dramatic contrast 3 to such international symbols as the skyscraper skyline, the United Nations buildings, Wall Street, the Statue of Liberty, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Times Square, and Broadway theatres; To commuters (1) it is an unbearable beehive 5 of world trade and finance, mass media, business administration, fashion, and various business activities and manufacture — a place to leave as soon as possible in the evening for the more calm and peaceful atmosphere of greener suburbs. But to the residents of this mild, humid city, New York is in reality a collection of many neighborhoods scattered among the city's five boroughs 6 - Manhattan, Brooklyn, the Bronx, Queens, and Staten Island (formerly called Richmond) - each exhibiting its own life-style. To move from one neighborhood to another in the city's 787 square kilometers may be like passing from one country to another.

The Boroughs

Most of New York's skyscrapers are located on the island of Manhattan. Cultural landmarks include Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Madison Square Garden, and the elegant Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, where visiting presidents and royalty stay.

Tourists and even most New Yorkers, when they speak of "the city", mean Manhattan. The boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens, the Bronx, and Staten Island — each of them a separate county — remain the subject of jokes among New Yorkers as well as strangers. Brooklyn continues to be laughed at with the title of the Thomas Wolfe story Only the Dead Know Brooklyn. Queens is known as "the borough of cemeteries ." The Bronx is constantly reminded that its greatest claim to fame may be the funny noise popularized in the borough's Yankee Stadium and known as "the Bronx cheer". And Staten Island, closer to the big chimneys of New Jersey than to its political family, is treated as outlying "wilderness. Since most residents of these four boroughs work in Manhattan, the ever-lasting feeling



remains that Brooklyn, Queens, the Bronx, and Staten Island are mere "bedrooms" of Manhattan.



Contrary to the impression created by its *soaring* Duildings, transportation *crushes* D, and mass outpourings from office buildings, the economic life of New York City rests not on a few vast corporations but on a *multitude* Of small businesses and manufacturing establishments. This diversity in the world's financial capital gives the city the *flexibility* and strength to withstand recession or depression with less suffering than Detroit, for instance, with its dependence on huge automobile plants, or southern California, supported so heavily by government contracts in the aerospace and defense industries.

New York also has the one of the most complex subway systems in the U.S. and some of the world's largest airports (John F Kennedy — JFK, La Guardia, and Newark), which provide visitors from the world easy and

Education

New York is the only city in the United States with a large public-university system. The many fine institutions of higher education throughout the five boroughs include Columbia University (1754), New York University (1831), Pratt Institute (1887), the Manhattan School of Music (1917) etc. The higher education program has become increasingly important since the introduction of "open admission" in 1970, which allows any high school graduate into either a senior or a community college, depending on *grades* ①. Before open admission the standards for entrance into senior colleges were very high.

The private universities offer, in addition to the usual courses, special areas of study. Columbia University, for instance, offers Russian studies and has a school of journalism; Fordham University offers *medieval* studies; and New York University has courses in art scholarship. The Juilliard School is world-renowned for music, theatre,

and dance, and the Rockefeller University is famous for bio-medical science.



Cultural Life

Though many New Yorkers have come to think of the Fun City label pinned on their city as a bad joke, there may still be a great deal of truth in the nickname. For those who seek pleasure in almost any form, New York City is, as it has been for more than a century, "the place to go". Whether it is theatre, music, ballet, painting, or literature or whether it is baseball, football, basketball, track, hockey , boxing, horse racing, soccer, cricket; or whether it is live, filmed, or printed erotica — whatever the taste of man or woman in culture, arts, sports, or sex, New York City has it in abundance . The city is the nation's greatest culture center — and a major fleshpot. So many movies, books, plays, and television shows have been written about New York that even its street names are known nationwide. Wall Street is famous for finance,

Madison Avenue means advertising, and Fifth Avenue stands for world-class shopping. New York's neighborhoods are also famous. Greenwich Village, or the Village, has fostered some of the world's great writers; Soho is an *enclave* ^① of artists and Harlem has a priceless musical *heritage* ^②.

The twin towers once stood over lower Manhattan as a proud symbol of New York City's strength in the world of finance. But they're no longer there. On the morning of September 11, 2001, a *terrorist* attack destroyed immediately both towers and the area surrounding them. But New Yorkers face the tragedy with great courage and confidence. New York is still a city of energy and prosperity.

New York City's secret is the ongoing *infusion* ⁽⁴⁾ of energy and talent it gets from the rest of the country and immigrants from around the world. *Moss Hart* ⁽⁵⁾ once said, "The only certificate the city asked was the courage to dream. For those who did, it unlocked its gates and
