



# The Year at a Glance

- Visitation increased 18% with almost 18,000 in attendance.
- A \$1.2 Million House Preservation Project (Phase I of III) addressing structural deficits, exterior upgrades and repairs, and the handicapped accessibility of several rooms on the first floor of the House was completed.
- The AAM Public Dimension Assessment, an 18 month process of self-study, peer review, and implementation was completed by a task force comprised of community leaders, volunteers, staff, and board.
- A study to evaluate the feasibility of installing a fire protection system in the

House was initiated through a \$64,000 grant from The Getty Foundation.

- The Pearl S Buck Archival Collection was assessed by 55 external researchers, and an electronically-searchable index of the collection was posted on our web site for public use.
- A series of changing exhibits was offered including: 70th Anniversary of Pearl S. Buck's Nobel Prize, Personal Pearl, A Whimsical Christmas, and historic letters from famous people that were discovered with the recovery of "The Good Earth" Manuscript.
  - Rental of the Pearl S. Buck Historic Site for wedding receptions increased 40%.







# The Year at a Glance

• Hague Accreditation was awarded for a five year period, the longest time frame possible issued to agencies demonstrating a higher level of overall compliance with standards.

• State licensing audits by the states of Virginia, Delaware, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania found Welcome House in full compliance with all regulations and requirements.

• A total of 53 children were placed with loving families, a 38% decrease as a result of changes in Korea and China's policies.

Post adoption services, including

case assessment and management, support groups, and respite increased 59% with services provided to 35 families.

 A grant through Reed Technology & Information Services provided post placement birth cultural education and activities to 1460 children and parents.

• Search service requests increased 29% with services provided to a total of 56 adoptees.


