VORWORT

Das Verhältnis der preskriptiven zur deskriptiven Grammatik ist auf Tagungen und in Fachzeitschriften des In- und Auslands ausgiebig behandelt worden. Das Ergebnis läßt sich mit A. Towsey wie folgt zusammenfassen: "There is not necessarily any conflict between these two views of grammar. The two kinds of grammar are really complimentary".

Die struktuierte preskriptive Grammatik erfaßt in Regeln, was sich an allgemeiner Struktur von Einzelfällen abhebt. Die vokabulare deskriptive Grammatik geht vom Einzelfall aus. Sie erfaßt das Einzelwort in seiner grammatischen Qualität und grenzt sein grammatisches Feld scharf ab. Sie umfaßt picht nur general facts, sondern auch special facts. Sie gibt Antwort auf viele Fragen, auf die uns die preskriptive Grammatik die Antwort schuldig bleibt. Sie ist somit die notwendige Ergänzung zur traditionellen Grammatik in Regeln.

Alphabetisch geordnet ergeben die grammatischen Felder ein grammatisches deskriptives Wörterbuch, das schnelle Orientierung ermöglicht.
