NOTES ON MONEY VALUES

THE following notes have been compiled from information contained in Muret-Saunders's German-English Dictionary, in Professor W. H. Bruford's *Germany in the Eighteenth Century* (Cambridge, 1935), in Professor O. E. Deutsch's *Schubert: A Documentary Biography* (London, 1946) and in the letters of Beethoven, who occasionally quotes the equivalent values of coins and frequently refers to the fluctuating rates of exchange between Austria and some other countries. As in the early nineteenth century there were several standards in common use for the minting of gold and silver coins, the values here given are of necessity only approximate. Furthermore, no allowance has been made for the change in purchasing power of English money since the eighteenth century.

GERMANY AND AUSTRIA

Taking the South German kreuzer as the standard, the following equivalent values of small coins are obtained:

- 1 kreuzer = four pfennige, about one halfpenny.
- [1 heller = about half a farthing.]
- 1 pfennig = less than one heller, a mite.]
- 1 groschen = about three kreuzer, or 1½d., the value quoted in Sir George Smart's *Journals* during his visit to Vienna in 1825.
- 1 gulden (60 kreuzer) = about two shillings.
- 1 reichsthaler (90 kreuzer) = about three shillings.
- 1 rheinthaler (120 kreuzer) = about four shillings.

The following gold coins were in common use in Germany and Austria:

- 1 ducat (used all over Europe) = 4½ gulden, about nine shillings.
- 1 pistole (originally a Spanish coin, used all over Europe) = 7½ gulden, about fifteen shillings.
- 1 friedrich d'or (used chiefly in Prussia) = 8 gulden, about sixteen shillings.

NOTES ON MONEY VALUES

1 carolin (used chiefly in South Germany) = 9 gulden, about eighteen shillings.

The French louis d'or, the value of which fluctuated considerably, was worth slightly more than two ducats, about twenty shillings.

The Italian zecchino (a Venetian gold coin) was worth slightly more than one ducat, about ten shillings.

During the Napoleonic wars the Austrian State went bankrupt, and by a *Finanz-Patent* promulgated on February 20, 1811 and put into force three weeks later, an emergency currency was introduced. Redemption bonds (*Einlösungsscheine*) were substituted for banknotes at the rate of one for five. Thus paper money was depreciated to one-fifth of its nominal value and converted into a new State paper currency, called *Wiener Währung* (i.e. Viennese currency, V.C.). Another currency which continued to be used after the introduction of the new paper currency was the old *Konventionsmünze* (i.e. Assimilated coinage, A.C.). This currency had been adopted in 1753 by a treaty with Bavaria and was based on the 20-gulden rate, called *Konventionsfuss*. There were 60 kreuzer to the gulden both in the old currency and in the new. But from 1811 onwards 5 gulden V.C. were worth only about 2 gulden A.C. Hence Beethoven's income of 4000 gulden guaranteed by his three patrons in 1809 became in 1811 approximately 1600 gulden. However, the original value of his income was eventually restored, because the quarterly payments were soon made in redemption bonds.

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
