

# PREFACE

The publication of this 16th Edition of Nelson Textbook of Pediatrics coincides with the beginning of the 21st century. The bridging of two centuries creates the opportunity to reflect on past accomplishments, current capabilities, and future hopes. There have been dramatic advances in the prevention and treatment of diseases of childhood. Indeed, many diseases have all but disappeared, and research offers great promise in addressing the new and re-emerging diseases that plague the health of children. Although war, famine, pestilence, poverty, and malfunctioning social systems continue to afflict many of the world's children, ironically the promise of medicine and biologic sciences has never been greater.
