I have tried, in the present monograph, to write a study of the intellectual property (IP) law of Cyprus. This is the first monograph of its kind, to my knowledge. Further, as it may be observed, there is not much bibliography on intellectual property matters in Cyprus. The case law is also scarce. This has made my task even more difficult.

Under these circumstances, I have tried to write about the Cypriot municipal (national) law, with the main sources being the national laws, the limited existing bibliography and case law. Cyprus, as it is known, is a member of the Madrid Agreement concerning the International Registration of Marks, and Protocol since 4 November 2003, and of the European Union since 1 May 2004. These aspects are not examined in this monograph.

Despite these limitations, I hope that this study, as the first of its kind, will be of use to both students and practitioners of intellectual property law. And that it will be the beginning for future studies on special topics of IP law in Cyprus.

The law is stated, generally, as of December 2006, even though there are some facts of later dates mentioned.
