性写作、文学理论、多语并置、大屠杀以及当代小说,所探讨的内容涉及政治、宗教、种族、性别、意识形态、历史和伦理,其研究的着眼点则是犹太文学与美国文学的双重语境。本书卷首刊登的美国犹太文学年表与每篇论文所附的导读索引,是该领域进一步研究的重要指南。

本书的读者对象为大学外语教师,外国文学研究人员,外国文学专业的研究生、博士生,以及 具备了较高英语阅读能力的外国文学爱好者。

EMILY MILLER BUDICK teaches American literature at The Hebrew University of Jerusalem and holds the Ann and Joseph Edelman Chair in American Studies. TRESA GRAUER is Lecturer in the Department of Foreign Literatures and Linguistics at Ben-Gurion University of the Negev. Larry Silberstein and "'A Drastically Bifurcated Legacy': Homeland and Jewish Identity in Contemporary Jewish American Literature," in *Divergent Jewish Cultures: Israel and America*, eds. SUSAN GUBAR is Distinguished Professor of English at Indiana University. She has co-authored and co-edited a number of books with Sandra M. Her most recent publication is Poetry After Auschwitz: Remembering What One Never Knew.

SUSANNAH HESCHEL is the Eli Black Associate Professor of Jewish Studies at Dartmouth College, New Hampshire, in the Department of Religion, and serves as Chair of the Jewish Studies Program. She is the author of numerous studies of modern Jewish thought, including Abraham Geiger and the Jewish Jesus, which won a National Jewish Book Award, and is co-editor of Insider/Outsider: Multiculturalism and American Jews. MICHAEL P. KRAMER chairs the English Department and directs the Anne Shachter Smith Memorial Project in Literature at Bar-Ilan University. He has published *Imagining Language in America* and *New Essays on Bellow's Seize the Day*, as well numerous essays on American and Jewish literary and intellectual history. His current projects include a study of Jewish American thought and writing called "The Art of Assimilation" and, with Menahem Blondheim, "The Orthodox Jewish Sermon in America."

ALAN MINTZ is the Chana Kekst Professor of Hebrew Literature at the Jewish Theological Seminary, New York. He has been the co-editor of Prooftexts: A Journal of Jewish Literary History since its founding in 1981. DAVID G. ROSKIES is Professor of Jewish Literature at the Jewish Theological Seminary, New York. He is the author of Against the Apocalypse, A Bridge of Longing, The Jewish Search for a Usable Past, and other studies in Jewish cultural history. He is co-founder and co-editor of Prooftexts and is Editor-in-Chief of the New Yiddish Library.

MAEERA Y. SHREIBER is Assistant Professor of English at the University of Utah. She is the author of numerous articles in scholarly journals (including PMLA and Genre) and in essay collections; she is the co-editor of both Dwelling in Possibility: Women Poets and Critics on Poetry and Mina Loy: Woman and Poet. She is currently completing a book on Jewish American poetry and poetics.

ALAN WALD is Director of the Program in American Culture and Professor of English at the University of Michigan. He is the author of five scholarly books on the US literary Left and editor of "The Radical Novel Reconsidered" series at the University of Illinois Press.

PRISCILLA WALD is Associate Professor of English and an Affiliate in the Center for the Study of Medical Ethics and Humanities and in the Women's Studies Program at Duke University, North Carolina.
