



阅读是获取信息的重要手段,大学英语的最主要目标之一就是培养学生"具有较强的阅读能力"。为了帮助学生切实有效地达到这一目的,必须有大量的语言输入(input)。因此,《大学英语阅读与欣赏》便应运而生。本书是以国家教育部颁发的《大学英语教学基本要求》为依据,参照大学英语四级考试大纲,为帮助学生有效地掌握各项阅读微技能及基本要求规定的阅读速度等有关指标而专门设计、编著的。主要供普通高等院校非英语专业的本专科生、研究生及其他英语学习者在课外使用。

本书所提供的阅读素材题材广泛,体裁多样,内容新颖,具有较强的科学性和一定的趣味性,可读性强,力求使读者在提高阅读水平的同时,获得一定的科学知识及文化背景知识。本书旨在通过多种形式的大量阅读练习帮助学生提高阅读能力和阅读速度,克服背景知识贫乏、词汇量少等问题,帮助学生复习和巩固已掌握的学习技能,提高学生实际应用英语的能力,达到规定的教学要求。

本书共分 4 册,每册 18 个单元,每个单元含 5 篇长短不一、内容各异的文章。考虑到大学英语教学既要对学生进行素质教育,又要帮助他们通过 CET 考试,因此,本书在练习上采用了 CET 的题型,以兼顾到各方面的需要。练习形式包括综合填空、多项选择、英译汉、判断与简短回答问题。

本套系列阅读练习已在江苏科技大学等高校试用多年, 应广大读者的要求,现已正式出版。本书由江苏科技大学 外国语学院具有多年大学英语教学经验的教师所编写,由 朱慧敏担任总主编,由王令坤教授主审。参加本书编著工作的教师有:

On the other hand, we eat not only because we have to do so, but also because we enjoy doing so. Having satisfied our hunger, eating can then be a kind of enjoyment. There are many people, however, who do not eat the food they dislike and consequently suffer from malnutrition[®]. So, for the sake of health, we have to eat some even though we may not like it.

Similarly, to enrich our minds, we need information and knowledge, which can be obtained through reading. Reading is one of the most important ways of learning. Without reading our minds will become empty like that of an animal. Sometimes, we take reading as a pastime, and we relax and learn at the same time. Since recreation is involved, we will naturally have a partiality for some

Passage 3

Thousands of travelers were facing long delays at Sydney airport last night after a fire broke out in its new multi-million-dollar air traffic control tower.

All incoming and outgoing flights were held up, and pilots were forced to land without the normal technical support. Firemen were called when acrid[®] smoke from a computer began to fill the main work area. The smoke was believed to have been caused by some

electrical fault. Staff were evacuated[®] from the building and ferried to the old control tower, where flight controllers were able to work at a limited capacity. But they were unable to halt disruption to Australia's national and international airline schedules.

The knock-on effect caused delays for thousands of people waiting at other airports in the country. An airport spokesman said it would take some hours before planes would be running on schedule again. But the control tower was not expected to be fully operational before mid-evening.

The fire, which forced the evacuation of staff from the control tower, could not have come at a worse time.

This is the busiest period of the year for the airport with thousands of travelers using the terminal for their Christmas holiday. It was estimated that the airport's international terminal was preparing to service 35 000 passengers per day over the next few days before Christmas, a 35 percent increase compared to the same festive period last year. The increase in passenger traffic is largely due to publicity following the Olympic Games and the launch of two new airlines, analysts said.

The Airport Co-ordination Authority predicts a 25 percent increase in flights over the next year. The bulk of visitors to Australia is from New Zealand, with tourists from Japan in second place.

The fire was the third major incident at the airport this year. Equipment failure led to chaos and serious flight delays on two occasions just before the commencement of this September's Sydney Olympics.

Ants have outsmarted me on more than one occasion. In particular, there was a weekend last summer when an ant scientist was a guest at our cottage. I boasted to my naturalist friend that I could store food in an open container for a whole week and keep it safely out of the reach o house ants.

Sunday night the experiment got under way. I put a large wooden tub on the kitchen floor of our cottage. After filling it to about the three-quarters mark with water. I placed a high wooden stand in the middle of it. On top of the stool, I put a saucer containing the bait; three or four pieces of rich chocolate candy.

Then I painted a wide band of very slow-drying glue around the outside of the wooden tub. With that, I stood back and admired my ant trap, fully confident that the bait would be untouched upon my return to the cottage the following weekend.

When my naturalist friend and I entered the cottage just six days later, ants were swarming over the bait!

Here's how they put me to shame. Single files of ants had marched head-on into the band of glue around the outside of the wooden tub. A handful of them had endured martyrdom, for they had embedded themselves end to end, and made causeways of their bodies.

The tempting bait on top of the stool must have caused the little creatures to use their brains to the limit. Ants hate water, but they had been courageous enough to build a highway across the stretch of water to a leg of the stool. They had assembled tiny pieces of grass and bits of wood no longer than a thirty-second of an inch, and had glued them together with saliva[®] until their bridge extended from shore to island. Once they reached the leg of the wooden stool, traffic was almost all one way toward to chocolate bait.

But there were some show-off fellows around, too; they were doing things which ants have been known to do very rarely. We noticed that a half dozen or so were walking across the ceiling, and when they came directly over the bait they let themselves fall squarely into the middle of their merry brothers.

A good marriage means growing as a couple but also growing as individuals. This isn't easy; marriage has always been difficult. Why then are we seeing so many divorces at this time? Yes, our modern social fabric[®] is thin, and yes, the permissiveness of society has created unrealistic expectations and thrown the family into disorder. But divorce is so common because people today are unwilling to exercise the self-discipline that marriage requires. They expect easy joy, like the entertainment on TV, the thrill of a good party.

Marriage takes some kind of sacrifice[®], not dreadful self-sacrifice of the soul, but some level of compromise. Some of one's

fantasies[®], some of one's legitimate[®] desires, have to be given up for the value of the marriage itself. "While all marital partners feel shackled at times, it is they who really choose to make the marital ties into confining chains or supporting bonds," says Dr. Whitaker, "Marriage requires sexual, financial and emotional discipline. A man and a woman cannot follow every impulse, cannot allow them to stop growing or changing".

A divorce is not an evil act. Sometimes it provides salvation[®] for people who have grown hopelessly apart or are frozen in patterns of pain or mutual unhappiness. Divorce can be like the first cut of the surgeon's knife, a step toward new health and a good life. On the other hand, if the partners can stay past the breaking up of the romantic myths into the development of real love and intimacy[®], they have achieved a work as amazing as the greatest cathedrals of the world. Marriages that do not fail but improve, that persist despite imperfections, are not only rare these days but offer a wondrous shelter in which the face of our mutual humanity can safely show itself.
