PREFACE.

A S soon as the Christian Literature Society issued a China Mission Year Book it at once established itself in public favour and each succeeding issue has marked an increase in the number of subscribers. Recent Conferences under the Presidency of Dr. J. R. Mott made it evident that if such a series did not already exist, it would have to be begun forthwith. The present book is the fourth of the series.

Our grateful thanks are due to all who contributed to its pages. The new features in the Directory entailed much extra labour, but it is hoped that its added usefulness will be a sufficient compensation. In this as in all things we seek to

be the servants of all.

Mr. W. Sheldon Ridge, who was to have contributed a chapter on "Government Changes and National Movements," was at the last moment prevented from doing so by absence in England, but Mr. Hsu Wei-yung's article is an excellent substitute.

The editor feels that his plans this year did not do full justice to certain subjects, e. g., Woman's Work, German Missions, and Educational Institutions. Next year he hopes to remedy these defects. The Educational Association now has a Secretary in the person of Rev. F. D. Gamewell, Ph.D., LL.D., and the China Continuation Committee's Secretary, Rev. E. C. Lobenstine, M.A., will be back shortly. The Year Book hopes that these gentlemen will co-öperate in future issues, very much to the advantage of the book.
