The Official Inaugural Ceremony at the Campidoglio (City Hall)

The Third International Poliomyelitis Conference was inaugurated with solemn ceremony at the Campidoglio in the halls of the Promoteca, and was presided over by Minister of Education Martino, a physician and professor of human physiology at the University of Messina.

He was accompanied by the vice-president, Dr. Morris Fishbein; the general chairman of the Conference, Prof. Carlo Marino-Zuco; the deputy-mayor of Rome, Avv. Andreoli, and the three honorary presidents of the Conference: Mr. Basil O'Connor, Prof. Luigi Spolverini and Mr. L. Ragoczy.

Among those present were: Prof. Saladino Cramarossa, as representative of the High Commissioner for Health and Hygiene; numerous members of Parliament; members of the Diplomatic Corps; various city councilors and many other dignitaries.

The deputy-mayor, Avv. Andreoli, welcomed the scientists in the name of the city of Rome.

Addresses followed by the Dane Ragoczy, who has spent part of his fortune in the fight against infantile paralysis; Professor Spolverini, who expressed complete confidence in the work of the Conference; the President of the International Poliomyelitis Conference, Mr. Basil O'Connor, who, at the end of his speech, offered

Professor Marino-Zuco a "symbolic gavel" dedicated to the memory of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the founder of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Professor Marino-Zuco, director of the Orthopedic Clinic of Rome, reiterated the purposes of the Conference and reported on the work done in Italy to fight poliomyelitis.

At the conclusion, after having welcomed the participants at the Conference in the name of the Italian Government, Minister Martino expressed the hope that science may triumph in the fight against infantile paralysis.

Immediately afterward, Professor Marino-Zuco read a cable from President Einaudi to the Conference: "Grateful for the invitation and extremely sorry to be unable to reach Rome on this day, I wish to convey to you and all the illustrious scientists of every country who convene in Rome today for the Third International Poliomyelitis Conference the welcome of Italy, as well as my personal one. The problems which the Conference proposes to study are of extreme interest to the world of science as well as to the people, who are conscious of the graveness of this disease, and I am certain to express a unanimous sentiment in expressing for the work which commences today my heartfelt wishes for an early success."

The Official Conference Banquet

The official banquet of the Third International Poliomyelitis Conference was held in the Grand Hotel in Rome on September 8, 1954. Dr. Morris Fishbein, vice-president of the International Poliomyelitis Conference, presided. Ambassadors of most of the nations which sent

official delegates to the Conference attended as guests and were introduced. The scene was colorful with the flags of all of the participating nations banked at the rear of the dais. Following are the addresses, somewhat condensed by the Editor, of the speakers on this occasion.

The Western Hemisphere

DR. RENATO BOMFIM

São Paulo, Brazil

It is an unexpected honor for me to be appointed as one of the speakers on this memorable night. I accepted this invitation with great pleasure not only as a demonstration of friendship to my country but also because the designation of one speaker for the whole Western Hemisphere means that the leaders of this Conference are reaffirming and emphasizing not only that America means a geographic unity but also that the nations of our continent truly are united by the same ideals and similar aspirations.

Regional competition between our nations and sometimes the so well-known exalted nationalism in the Latin American countries may give the wrong impression that we are divided. But we are driving the same road under the common principles of democracy, freedom and humanity.

First, we want to give thanks for the warm hospitality that we are receiving from the official authorities and our colleagues of this great country.

The choice of the immortal city of Rome for the headquarters of the Third International Poliomyelitis Conference adds great significance to this meeting. In this city, each corner, each monument, every historical ruin, makes one feel and live the tremendous power of the spirituality, the art, the intelligence and the humanism that made the greatness of ancient Rome. These are still the dominant expression of the people of this great country. All this is a source of inspiration for the crusade conducted by the National Foundation in the fight against poliomyelitis. This problem has been a challenge to medicine that goes back, as far as we know, to the primitive civilization of the Nile. The combined efforts of scientists and specialists from all over the world gradually are conquering poliomyelitis, the dreadful enemy of mankind, which is still killing, deforming and crippling a large part of humanity.

The National Foundation has created a most efficient organization for the victims of infantile paralysis in the United States. Also, it has promoted most important researches. Since 1948, the National Foundation has broadened its scope and organized these conferences to coordinate the efforts of scientists from all over the world. At last we feel that the moment in which this frightful enemy will be defeated is very close.

We are waiting with faith for the results of the vaccination of half a million American children promoted by the National Foundation; this is the largest experiment that has ever been done in the history of medicine. Whatever the results may be, the fight will continue until the very end. This is an ideal and also a statement of faith in the dawn of a new era in which our Western Hemisphere and Europe will be united for a better world.

Europe and the Eastern Hemisphere

PROF. GINO FRONTALI Rome, Italy

As an Italian, I feel proud that the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has chosen our country and particularly Rome for its Third International Poliomyelitis Conference. Italy may deserve this honor for the organization of her centers devoted to the study and the treatment of poliomyelitis, one of which was visited under the enthusiastic direction of Professor Spolverini.

But what has given us the warmth of a feeling which will remain deep-rooted in our hearts is the intimate co-operation with all of you from President O'Connor to Dr. Fishbein, Dr. Paul, Mr. Henwood and many others (a complete list would be too long) in the preparation, in the detailed organization and now in the splendid realization of this Conference. Consequently, the collaborative work in every one of our meetings has become a pleasure, and the intercourse with so many prominent colleagues of every part of the world renews our admiration for both the research work and

the effort which are made in your western world against poliomyelitis.

This reminds me of a child, who, having listened to grown-ups arguing about France, Germany, England, each of them wanting something different, interrupted the discussion and in his thin voice asked: "But is there something that everybody wants?"

We can answer: yes, everybody wants to defeat poliomyelitis and, borrowing the words from your and our President O'Connor, I shall conclude with his forecast: "Together we will advance into a new era of humanitarian endeavor, and mankind will ascend to the heights of true civilization under the leadership of men of science, men of faith and men of peace."

I lift my glass to the fortunes of these pacific fights and to their victory.

At the sessions we have listened to the famous experts of a score of nations read papers, while those from many more nations have joined in the discussions and have made valuable contributions to them. Many different languages have been used by the speakers. The interpreters have translated them into the official languages of the conference so that one might listen in Italian, English, French, German or Spanish. But, actually, every speaker has used the same language. They have all spoken the common language of humanity.

This is the wonderful thing about our conference. It is the wonderful thing about all medicine and all science.

Medicine and science have always spoken an international language and the results of scientific and medical advances have been of equal benefit to all nations. In a day when the world is again troubled by an intensification of nationalism, it is well for us to remember this.

The effectiveness of penicillin does not depend on the nationality of the patient; it is equally useful in curing an Englishman, a Frenchman, a German, an Italian, an American or a member of any other nationality.

The radio works as well on this side of the Atlantic as it does on the other.

The scientists and the medical men are engaged in a common war on ignorance, disease, poverty and unhappiness. Their success benefits every nation. They make life everywhere happier, healthier and richer. It does not matter what the nationality of the medical scientist is. He is motivated by the same desire if he is a true scientist. The force which drives him on

is the desire to be of service to humanity. He spends long and weary days of hard work in his laboratory to uncover new knowledge that will make it possible for more people to live longer in better health. He has his allies in every nation, and they are all engaged in a common war. They are fighting the battle of humanity against the forces of disease. The advancement of science and medicine has always been an international story. The history of any great advancement will demonstrate it.

Because our meeting is here in Italy, I think of radio as illustrating this fact. I do so because of the magnificent role which a great Italian scientist, Guglielmo Marconi, played in its development. But the story of radio begins with scientific studies which no one at the time could have dreamed would lead to a marvelous and magical way of sending messages and the human voice across continents and oceans.

The story begins in the latter half of the nineteenth century, with attempts to understand the nature of light and electricity. These culminated in the electromagnetic theories of the great British scientist, James Clerk Maxwell, who proved that light consisted of electromagnetic waves. But if light was composed of such waves, there ought to be additional similar waves. These were discovered by the German scientist, Heinrich Hertz. The way was now open for the monumental achievement of Marconi. He took the discovery of Hertz out of the laboratory and transformed it into a practical invention for the use of the world. He made the first wireless telegraph, and, in the first decade of the twentieth century, sent the first message by wireless across the Atlantic Ocean. You know the story of what has happened since that day. The vacuum tube was developed by Fleming in England and by DeForest in the United States. Today we have the marvels of modern radio and television.

The history of this development illustrates a number of important aspects of scientific advance, in addition to the international char-
