This work sets out to cover the employment of merchant seamen, principally from the perspective of a labour lawyer, but it necessarily includes a great deal of material that would not normally be found in books on labour law. It is an attempt, too, to show how the law is but one kind of rule; that the collective organisations of workers and employers create and enforce rules of industrial practice that have just as important an effect on the lives of those they cover.

These are points which are discussed in some detail in the Introduction in the belief that the text itself is illustrative of a number of wider arguments which can legitimately be made about the division and organisation of legal studies in this area. For law is in many ways the complete social science. To be properly understood it requires some knowledge and study of economics, sociology, history and, of course, politics, for what is law (at least in statutory form) but the end product of the political process guided by the forces the other social sciences purport to study? This point is well brought out in the study of such an essential industry as shipping, where the forces that have shaped the special legal provisions regulating employment at sea have been frequently articulated.

The genesis of this book, by contrast, would remain hidden without express revelation. No author, and particularly one concerned with the perceptible gap between legal theory and reality, works in isolation owing nothing to others. Certainly this has not been the case here, and my deep and sincere thanks are owed to a great number of widely dispersed people. The work was originally undertaken as part of a wider study for the Ph.D. degree at the University of Cambridge. It is therefore my pleasant duty to record once again my thanks to the Master and Fellows of Sidney Sussex College for electing me to an Evan Lewis-Thomas Research Studentship which enabled me to begin, and to the Master and Fellows of Churchill College for electing me initially to the Bodossakis Fellowship, and subsequently to a College Research Fellowship, which enabled me to finish.

The substantive body of the work owes a great deal to a number of people at Cambridge; friends and colleagues who have stimulated my thoughts and criticised the product. Above all, the kindness, example,

criticism and help of Dr Paul O'Higgins of Christ's College was the most outstanding and invaluable, and of course, the most difficult to repay in anything other than profuse thanks. I would also like to take the opportunity of thanking Professor Bob Hepple, a Fellow of Clare College for most of the period during which the work was undertaken, for his encouragement and advice. I also owe a great deal to J.W.A. Thornely, former Senior Tutor of Sidney Sussex College, for his interest and support. No research into the aspects of the shipping industry discussed here, however, can be done with any sure measure of success without the help of the Research Officer of the National Union of Seamen, Jack Kinahan, and it is him that I have to thank for the countless references, points of interest, obscure documents, newspaper cuttings and industrial details which enabled me to get the most from the legal material in the Squire Law Library in Cambridge, and to appreciate the special collection of labour law materials and the help of the Deputy Librarian and his staff. Postscript

In the period between the completion of this book and its publication, Parliament enacted The Employment Protection (Consolidation) Act 1978. This act received the Royal Assent on 31 July, 1978 and, with minor exceptions, came into force on 1 November, 1978. It consolidates several of the statutes relating to the rights of employees and other matters including, in particular, most of the Redundancy Payments Act 1975, the Contracts of Employment Act 1972, parts of the Trade Union and Labour Relations Act 1974, and much of the Employment Protection Act 1975. The text makes reference to these statutes prior to the passage of this act. For the convenience of readers a table is included at the end of the Table of Statutes showing the destinations of the enactments repealed and replaced by this act.
