#### PREFACE TO PART II

The classification of medical and technical works is exceedingly difficult, and is becoming increasingly so, owing to the unfortunately growing practice of Publishers giving not only uninformative, but frequently misleading titles to otherwise serious works. It is absolutely necessary for anyone working at classification to be able to refer to the particular volume to determine its place.

The suggestion that the Dewey System of Classification should be followed, and that the reference numbers used in that system should be given was considered, but for various reasons it was decided not to attempt it in the present edition. From frequent inquiries as to the subjects covered by the Library, it appeared that an alphabetical list might be of use. This will be found on pp. 922–928 and provides some indication of the scope of the Library.

In Part II the initials of Authors have been added to facilitate reference to the body of the Catalogue. The year of publication of each book is also given, as this may save the time of Readers who wish to refer only to the most recent works. In a much larger number of cases than formerly, a word or two has been added to indicate the nature and scope of the book, which will also help Readers, it is hoped, when using the Index. Considerations of space, however, limit the possibilities in this direction, and it must be remembered that, as the title indicates, the Index is of the subjects covered by the Library, with the names of Authors who have written upon them. It is not a duplication of the Catalogue, to which reference must be made for full titles, etc.

#### PREFACE

The great addition to the membership of the Library in the last three or four years, and the consequent increase in the demand for the Catalogue, made it necessary to prepare this new edition, as the last (to December, 1937) has been out of print for some time. A Supplement was issued covering the period from January, 1938, to December, 1941. This is also out of print.

The present revision has been carried out to the end of 1943. Formerly new editions were issued at intervals of ten years, with two Supplements at intervening periods.

The preparation of the matter for the Printer involves some months of work. The titles contained in the Supplement, as well as the Card Index of two years have to be worked in with the titles in the body of the last Catalogue, in addition to which a large number of titles of books withdrawn on account of age, disuse, or loss have to be deleted.

The books in the Library are grouped in four divisions, according to size, each division being arranged in strict alphabetical order under the Author's name, and not classified in subjects. It has been found that this conduces to efficiency and quickness of service. In the following table approximate sizes in inches are given:—

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(Where the size is given in the Catalogue as "8vo" Demy 8vo is understood.)

The Publishers take this opportunity of expressing their appreciation of the way the reviews of the last edition testify both to the value and usefulness of this Catalogue, as well as to the service which the Library affords to members of the medical and other scientific professions. One reviewer, calling to mind the fact that Carlyle's impatience at the loss of time in waiting for books at the British Museum and that books cannot be taken away for home reading led to the founding of the London Library, suggests the possibility that the idea of founding a Library for Medical workers may have arisen from this. It is quite probable, as the Founder was a great admirer of Carlyle. An interesting fact mentioned in another review, showing the wide-spread usefulness of the Catalogue, is that it may be consulted in the Medical Research Laboratory in Nairobi.

Suggestions from Subscribers will always be welcomed, and will be noted for consideration when the next edition is called for.

## LENDING LIBRARY

The Library was established in 1848 to supply mainly the needs of members of the medical profession, and also to lend out books of scientific or philosophic interest not to be found in the ordinary circulating libraries.

To meet the requirements of Scientists engaged in the Research Departments of Industrial Firms the scope of the Library was extended to include a wide range of technical subjects. That this has proved of service is shown by the variety of manufactures represented by subscriptions from, amongst others—India-rubber Manufacturers; Gas and Coal Companies; Electrical Engineers; Neon-Lighting; Manufacturing Chemists; Wholesale Druggists; Manufacturers of Photographic Materials, Chocolate, Jam, Patent Foods, Soap, Plastics, Surgical Instruments, Machinery; and Publishers.

Subscriptions are received from individuals, or from Book Clubs, Medical and Scientific Societies, Research Departments, etc., in all parts of the world.

It may perhaps be pointed out that the rates of subscription will be found to compare favourably with any ordinary circulating library. There is only one class of subscription, which entitles every subscriber to the best service the Library can render.

It has not been found practicable to offer a so-called "guaranteed service"—at an increased rate of subscription—owing to the special circumstances connected with the publication of scientific and technical literature. But this service is practically secured to all subscribers by the addition of further copies of new works whenever required during the first six months following publication. Since 1939 it has become increasingly difficult to carry out this practice. The very limited amount of paper allowed for books of all kinds has restricted the publishers' quota to less than half the normal. This has resulted in the size of the edition of standard works being reduced, though the demand has greatly increased. Consequently it frequently happens that books may be unobtainable from the publishers for months at a time. At all times any special requirement for urgent scientific work will be carefully considered.

The Library includes all works of any importance, English, American and Foreign (when translated), in Medicine and Science generally.

Every book in the Library is the latest revised edition. On publication of a new edition (with revisions) all copies of the previous edition on the shelves are immediately withdrawn, and copies coming back from subscribers are not returned to the shelves.

The current issues of the Lancet, British Medical Journal, Clinical Journal and Nature may be read in the Reading Room, and the bound

volumes may be borrowed. *The Practitioner* and certain other periodicals are available in the Reading Room, but as most users of the Library are members of some learned or professional Association in whose Libraries periodicals are regularly to be found, they are not added to the Library. The following Reports and Annuals are added as published:—

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Proceedings of the Prehistoric Society of East Anglia.

Proceedings of the Royal Society of Medicine.

Reports on Progress in Physics.

Year Books of Dentistry; Dermatology and Syphilology; Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat; General Medicine; Neurology, Psychiatry and Endocrinology; Obstetrics and Gynacology; Pediatrics; Physical Therapy; Radiology; General Therapeutics; and Urology.

A number of other periodicals will be found in the Reading Room, or may be borrowed by Country Subscribers when available.

The Reading Room is open to all Subscribers desiring to study or make notes from works they may not need to take away for home reading.

The aim of the Catalogue is to provide Subscribers with the titles of the books available in the Library. It contains many monographs and standard works now out of print, but ancient works of historical importance only are not included, as they can be consulted in the Libraries of Scientific Societies or Universities and other Institutions.

For reasons of space and practical usefulness, books for which there is no demand and text-books which have passed out of date are withdrawn from time to time, but in spite of these measures Part I of the present edition runs to 714 pages, an increase of 164 pages over the last.

It is estimated that the Catalogue includes about 24,000 titles, while, counting the large number of duplicates of all the more frequently required works, the number of volumes in circulation and in the Library is over 80,000.

It is believed that "Lewis's Library Catalogue" forms a useful work of reference for Librarians as well as for readers, and it is hoped that this new edition will still perform that service.

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
