INTRODUCTION

Workers' Compensation laws were enacted to protect employees who suffer work-related disability resulting from injury or disease, by providing monetary compensation and other benefits. This helps the employee avoid the financial disaster associated with loss of income and mounting medical bills, and eliminates the need for litigation with the employer. In addition, workers compensation laws provide benefits to the dependents of an employee who dies as a result of work-related injury or illness.

Workers' compensation laws are based on Federal and state statutes. State workers' compensation laws cover most workers who are not federal employees. The Federal statutes apply to federal workers. In addition, because Congress is constitutionally required to regulate interstate commerce pursuant to Article 1, Section 8 of the U.S. Constitution, certain workers employed in interstate commerce related activities are also covered under Federal law.

Although state workers' compensation laws may vary, this Almanac sets forth a general discussion of the common characteristics of a workers' compensation system. The reader is advised to check his or her own jurisdiction concerning issues that are state-specific, such as procedural rules or available benefits.

This Almanac also sets forth an overview of the Federal workers' compensation programs administered by the U.S. Department of Labor's Office of Workers' Compensation Programs ("OWCP"). The primary federal statute governing compensation for disabled non-military federal employees is the Federal Employment Compensation Act ("FECA").

In addition, this Almanac discusses the three other major federal disability programs administered by the OWCP: The Longshore and Harbor Workers' Compensation Program, which provides compensation and benefits to maritime employees and other related groups; The Black Lung Benefits Program, which provides compensation and benefits to

coal miners suffering from an occupational illness known as "black lung" disease; and The Energy Employees' Occupational Illness Compensation Program, which provides compensation and benefits to employees of the Department of Energy.

An overview of additional federal disability programs is also presented, including the Federal Employment Liability Act; the Merchant Marine Act; Veterans' Disability programs; and the Social Security Disability Insurance program.

The Appendix provides sample forms, applicable statutes, and other pertinent information and data. The Glossary contains definitions of many of the terms used throughout the Almanac.
