INTRODUCTION TO THE FOURTH EDITION

This new edition has been revised to include some 4,500 terms that have found their way into scientific and technical literature in the decade or more since the last revision. The new entries have been incorporated into the Supplement which follows the main body of the dictionary.

Special emphasis has been placed on new developments in the vastly expanded fields of automotive technology, astronautics, electronics, and electronic data processing. In addition, all the terms published by the French Ministry of National Education in January of 1973 as part of its vocabulary enrichment program have been included. Most of these terms are now obligatory—and others are strongly recommended—in all government publications, correspondence, and contracts.

INTRODUCTION TO THE THIRD EDITION

This dictionary has again been revised to include more than 5,000 new terms and newly recognized translations of terms that have become important in scientific literature since the Second Edition was published. These new entries have been incorporated in the Supplement which follows the main body of the dictionary. The new terms will, it is hoped, make the book much more useful to students and others who read or translate material published in French since 1951, of which there has been an increasing volume in all fields of science.

In addition to the revised Supplement, there has been added a Grammatical Guide for Translators at the back of the dictionary. The Guide, which covers a number of grammatical principles and matters of syntax frequent in scientific French prose, should be helpful to all users of the dictionary, and particularly to students who are preparing for certification examinations in reading scientific French. The Guide cannot of course be an adequate substitute for a textbook, but it provides a convenient reference and set of reminders about a number of "tricks of the trade" to aid in recognizing certain constructions and idioms that can give trouble to the inexperienced reader of French; it has been prepared with special reference to scientific facts, methods, and ideas.

The author wishes once more to express his gratitude to the many colleagues at Iowa State University, elsewhere in this country, and also abroad, whose advice and suggestions have meant so much to him in the preparation of a useful dictionary.

INTRODUCTION TO THE FIRST EDITION

The reception of the German-English Science Dictionary was so encouraging as to warrant the completion of this volume, planned and started years ago, to assist candidates for advanced degrees in acquiring a reading knowledge of the language.

Research within the various departments of science has gradually developed during these years into complicated interdepartmental problems. No entomological vocabulary, for example, can today dissociate itself from the many aspects of biology in general, even the physical sciences are embraced. Terms must be included covering not only entomology and the sciences into which it enters, such as embryology, cytology, physiology, morphology, genetics, ecology, but also chemistry, physics, botany, and medicine, all of which enter into modern treatises on insects.

Since the French irregular verb is always of some concern to the average graduate student in the sciences, the author has given many forms of the present, past, and future tenses as well as the past participles with at least one meaning and the infinitive form in parentheses in case other meanings are desired. In addition to this, some five hundred common distants have also been added, most of them based on verb forms. These idioms will facilitate the translation problems of a student who is not majoring in French.

This dictionary of 43,000 entries is, like the German, the first of its kind including terms of the agricultural, biological, and physical stiences, as well as many literary terms. Not all names of animals, insects, plants, or chemical compounds have been included, since each subject would make up a dictionary of its own.

Many words have been included even though the French and the English spellings are the same or practically so. If these words were not included, the average science student would easily give up, whereas now he will take the meaning, even though spelled like the French, and refer to Webster's Unabridged or the New Standard Dictionary for further definitions. The author uses both dictionaries constantly.

This dictionary in its compact size cannot claim completeness. The author would be grateful if its users would send him any useful suggestions with regard either to significant words that have been omitted or to incorrect meanings and equivalents.

This volume could not have become a reality without the inspiration from Dean R. E. Buchanan of Iowa State College and the constant aid of his graduate faculty, including the assistance of Dr. Charles H. Brown and Professor Robert W. Orr of the College Library.

Grateful acknowledgment is also made of the valuable support and sympathetic encouragement by President Charles E. Friley and Dr. Harold V. Gaskill. Dean of Science.
