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## INTRODUCTION

Quite frankly, we are in absolutely no position to set down diamond-hard advice, because half the time we don't know what the hell we are doing. If this book is about anything, it is about figuring out as you go along, about making up your own mind and trusting that mind, whatever the zeitgeist might be telling you.

It is the literary equivalent of the conversations that women have every day of the week. There might be a few more flights of fancy and movements of abstract thought: there will be more going off on tangents, because one of us is addicted to tangents. But the spirit of it is exactly the same as when you carefully put your friend back together after she has taken an existential bashing: you do the empathy, you make the jokes, you remind her that everyone gets a little bit crazy sometimes and there is no law against that.

We don't necessarily want to be correct; we want to make you feel that you are all right, in all your complexity, because there are entire industries out there devoted to insisting that you, as women, are somehow all wrong, and we've had enough of it. We say: the

received wisdom is not set in stone; there is another way. We are mad as hell and we're not going to take it anymore.
