Its principal aim is to assist the practitioner in finding his way amongst the myriad of provisions in the EU Treaties, the Statute of the Court of Justice of the European Union and the Rules of Procedure of the Court of Justice, General Court and Civil Service Tribunal that govern the system of remedies and the proceedings before these courts. For this reason, no attention is given to procedures that are of limited relevance to the practitioner, such as the procedure for infringement of Union law by Member States and the advisory procedure.

The book reflects the state of the law as of the end of summer 2015. It thus covers the renewed Rules of Procedure of the Court of Justice (2012), General Court (2015) and the Civil Service Tribunal (2014) as well as the updated provisions and practice directions.
