标本句 1. 和标本句 2. 可归纳为如下的公式:

这种設达形式的主要者眼点在于说明"A不是B",为了证明A不是B,于是引用C不是B这样一个众所周知的事实作为比较,以便使论据更加清楚,更有说账力。以标本句为例,为了说明鲸鱼不是鱼,使用马不是鱼这一众所对知的事实来作比较。

这个公式也可以用加下的形式来卷达:

A is not B, just as C is not (B).

甲不是乙,就象丙不是乙一样。

A whale is not a fish, just as a horse is not (a fish).

鲸非鱼, 就加马非鱼一样。

由于上述公式中前段与后段都有B, 故后段的B常被省略。如果前后两段都不是用B作为比较对象, 而是前段用B, 后段用D, 那來D就不能省去, 如:

He can no more swim than I can fly.

He cannot swim any more than I can fly.

他不能游泳就来我不能飞翔一样。

注意:

- no more than (或not any more tuan)和
not more than 有如下区别。比较:

He is no more industrious than you are.

(= He is not industrious any more
than you are.)

这两种形式很容易混淆,在某学院一九七七年四月编写的Third-year English Reading A, Grammar Notes 讲义中也把它们搞混了。该书第十页上载有:
