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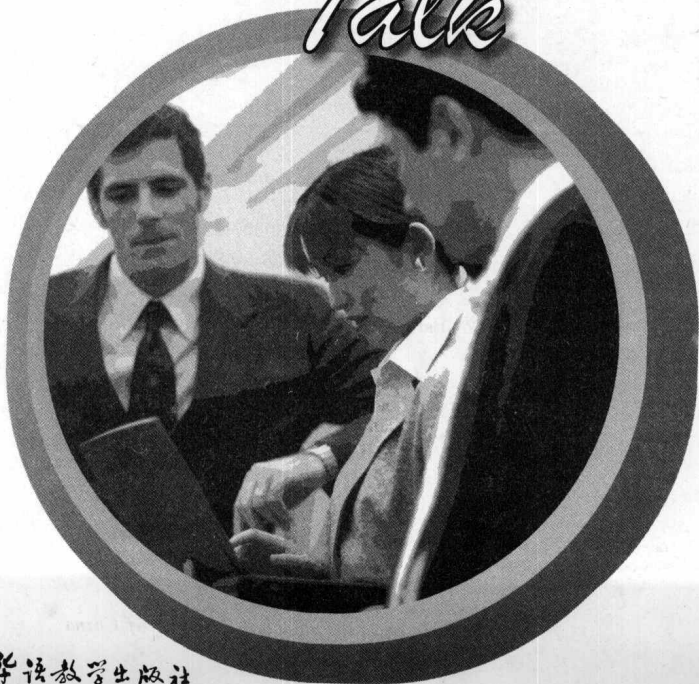

In view of no such complete series of teaching spoken Chinese in the market at present, and to meet the demands of the market in learning Chinese, especially spoken Chinese, we have spent a lot of energy on planning and compiling this series to meet the needs of readers.

al Chinese compiled and developed based on the theory of “Practical Communicative Functions”. It covers ten themes on social communication, life, travel, sports, leisure, shopping, emergency, campus, office, and IT and network. By imitating real life scenes of various situations, authentic, lively and practical oral expressions are revealed to allow learners to experience the charm of the Chinese language through lively, interesting and humorous situational conversations, and learn the most commonly used colloquial words, phrases, slangs, customary usages, everyday expressions and sentences. In another word, this is a very useful and practical encyclopedia on speaking Chinese. As long as one masters the contents of this series, one can respond fluently with the knowledge and oral expressions learned in whatever situations.

The characteristic of this series lies in its authentic, practical language expression, stresses on colloquialism, liveliness, and modernization of language. It selects high frequency words and the most vivid and authentic oral expressions used in daily life, work and study. One of my American friends who can speak perfect Chinese said to me after reading this series, “Very good. I think some expressions in the books are really typical, which I can’t learn from other places.” This shows that this series has made a breakthrough in Chinese learning materials, and achieved our original intention—that is to in-

Besides, we've also included a "related expressions" by listing more expressions and words related to the themes in order to make it convenient for learners to expand their language competency and enlarge their vocabularies.

In addition, to better help learners to know Chinese and the Chinese culture, we've set up a column of "Language and Cultural Tips" with the intention to introduce some common usage and grammatical knowledge, common mistakes and point out words and expressions that are easily confused, as well as tips on cultural background of the language. Our goal is not only to help learners learn Chinese expressions, but also get to know the cultural connotations and language knowledge.

We know that learning and practicing is linked together. One can't reach the goal of learning without practicing, so at the back of each unit we've put together some exercises, emphasizing on listening and speaking to assist learners in mastering what they have learned through practice.

I think everyone has his/her own ways of learning. As the saying goes, "Every major road leads to Rome." We believe that as long as one tries hard, one can learn Chinese well no matter which ways and methods they

adopt. We sincerely hope this series will be of some help in raising your real ability of speaking in Chinese.

Introduction

Part 1 Learn Pinyin My Way

Chinese *Pinyin* is not difficult to learn. It mainly includes three parts: initials, finals and tones. In this chapter you'll be introduced to some basic knowledge of *Pinyin*, how to pronounce them, the differences between *Pinyin* and the English phonetics, and ways to remember them, so that you can read *Pinyin* easily and pronounce them in the later parts of the book. This will help you to study Chinese along with the audios by yourself.

1. Initials

There are 23 initials in Chinese *Pinyin*. Many of them have similar sounds to the English consonants. Please look at Table 1 and compare them with the English version.

2. Finals

There are 35 finals in Chinese *Pinyin*. To be more specific, there are six single finals and 29 compound finals. The six single finals are: *a, o, e, i, u, and ü*. Under each final there are several compound finals. The key to remember them, is to remember the six single finals first, then remember the compound finals of each final as a group. There is a rule in doing it. Look at Table 2 and compare them with the English version.

3. Tones

The Chinese Mandarin has four tones—the first tone “—”, the second tone “ˊ”, the third tone “ˇ”, and the fourth tone “ˋ”. Different tones express different meanings. So it is important to master all four tones in order not to mislead others when you’re speaking.

How does one practice the four tones is a common question. Here is one way to do it: Do you know how to sing songs? Yes, use that to help you. For example: ā, á, ǎ, à, the first tone “ā” is a high tone, so you should sing it high pitched as if you’re saying the word “Hi”; the second tone goes from low to high as if you’re saying the word “what?”; the third tone is like a valley, you can sing it as if saying the word “whoa”; and the fourth tone goes from high to low as if you’re saying the word “Go!” Isn’t it easy? Now let’s practice the four tones.
