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高效英语会话教程

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我国大学英语教学在新世纪的目标是:"培养学生的综 合应用能力,特别是听说能力,使他们在今后工作和社会交 往中能用英语有效地进行口头和书面的信息交流,同时增强 其自主学习能力,提高综合文化素养,以适应我国社会发展 和国际交流的需要"。然而, 高校英语教学的现状却不能令 人乐观,特别是口语,学生往往要么是有话说不出,要么是 说出来了却语音语法不规范。为了改变这种状况, 我们于 1999年成立课题组,从英语的特点和英语教学规律两个方 面结合起来进行研究。2000年,课题组申报的《英语语言 应用能力构架与课程设置的相关性研究》经教育部审查批准 列入"新世纪高等教育教学改革工程"。该研究工程共有17 个重点资助课题, 我们申报的课题是其中之一。2003年10 月29日,该课题通过结题验收,其中一部分研究成果获湖 南省普通高等学校教学改革成果一等奖。2004年8月,湖 南人民出版社出版了《大学英语教学论》,该书完整地反映 了我们的研究成果。根据验收专家的鉴定,这些成果主要 是: 1. 创建了"以培养学生英语语言应用能力为目标"的 教学理论框架,完成了体现该教育思想的大学英语课程新设 计; 2. 创构了融多项技能于一体的大学英语 ITILA 教学模式 和"五步双向反思动态互补"实践模式,建立了"主题教 学、自主学习、双向反思"教学理念; 3. 建立了新的注重 教学过程的形成性教学评估体系。

本教材就是在上述背景下诞生的,它的特色在于:第一,教学理念创新。我们已经将专家肯定的全部新的教学理念贯彻于教材编写中。本教材的编写,是我们运用自己创新的教学理念来创新教材的一次实践。第二,教材内容创新。本教材不是传统的学习典范型教材,它是按新的教学理念编

写的学习资源型教材。我们提供的不只是学生学习的典范材料,而是给学生营造了可以自主学习、协作学习、研究性学习的一种环境、一种资源。它像电影的文学剧本,富有弹性,不同的导演,不同的演员,将创造出不同的活剧。第三,教学方法创新。根据主题教学要求和双向互动原则,本教材的每一单元,都在中西文化的宝库中择优选萃,锁定一个主题,设计一串教学环节,创设应用语言的具体情境,提供学与练的具体资料,安排师生互动的具体接口;其图文并茂的版面,激情引趣的内容,使学生能在教师的引导下轻松愉快地学好知识、增长才干。

本教材分上下两册,每册由6个单元组成。每个单元围绕同一个主题,安排了三课教学内容和一个口语模拟测试。这种体例既密切结合大学英语教学要求和专业英语教学的目标,同时也充分考虑到了一般英语口语学习者的需要。本书既是大学生参加全国大学英语口语考试的必备教材,也是到外企求职或从事外事、旅游、参加国际学术交流的人员必须接受的基础口语训练,还是参加全国公共英语口语等级考试以及部分雅思口语考试的基础教材。

本教材已在中南大学部分班级约800多名学生中试用, 在试用的基础上进行了反复修改。谨此机会,我们衷心感谢 一如既往地关心、支持我们进行这项教改的领导、同行专家、 朋友、学生以及为本教材提供出版方便的湖南人民出版社。

由于时间紧迫,本教材的编写还没有达到理想的境界, 我们殷切希望广大师生在使用过程中提出宝贵的修改意见, 以利我们修订时参考,我们将不胜感激。

Language and culture hints

- 1. Please call me.../ You can call me... In addressing someone you have just met, it is always safer to use his or her family name plus the appropriate title, e. g. "Mr. Williams", "Miss Smith", etc. However, many people, especially the young, prefer to call each other by their first names (e. g. Joseph, Elizabeth) or nicknames even when they are meeting for the first time. This way of addressing helps to bring people together.
- The Last name is a family name or surname. It's the name a person shares with other members of the family.
 - **The First name** is a given name. It's a personal name given to someone at birth or baptism and used before a family name. A **Nickname** is a name used informally instead of a person's first name (e. g. Joe for Joseph, Liz for Elizabeth).
- 3. When we make an introduction on a formal occasion, we need to introduce men to women, younger people to elder ones, and people with lower positions to those with senior positions.
