# 《跨越大学英语写作》教师用书

## 前言

目前大学英语界的状况是：教师少，学生多。教师苦于没有足够的时间和精力经常批改众多的学生作文，大学生英语写作实践甚少，写作水平普遍不高。

如何提高学生英语写作能力，同时又使教师从繁重的教学工作中解放出来，是作者探讨的方向。本书根据最新的外语写作教学理念，尝试采用“写作过程法”，即讨论式写作教学，注重学生课外练习。从遣词造句、语篇分析、段落结构、文章写作等方面着手，帮助非英语专业的大学生，通过循序渐进的基础写作练习达到大纲规定的写作要求。

本书共有4个部分，每部分有10个写作单元，可配合任何大学英语教材使用。建议采用的方法是：每篇课文配合一个单元的写作训练，由学生在课外完成，教师不需逐篇批改，只须每周在课堂上抽出15至20分钟时间组织学生讨论，检查学生练习，并定期进行写作测试。使用本书既可节省教师批改作文的时间，又能达到提高学生写作水平的目的。自学者可根据情况自行安排进度。

《跨越大学英语写作》教师用书是《跨越大学英语写作》学生用书的参考答案。其中很多答案是变数，特别是看图写话和命题作文部分。因为观点的表述是仁者见仁，智者见智，没有统一的标准，所以本书答案仅供参考。由于水平有限，误漏在所难免，希望广大同行给我们提出宝贵意见，以便再版时更正。
