· Student's book 学生用书(双色)





Passage 1

American Body Language

Gestures are the "silent language" of every culture. We point a finger or move another part of the body to show what we want to say.



In the United States, people **greet** each other with a **hand-shake**. The handshake must be firm. Friends may place a hand on the other's arm or **shoulder**. Some people, usually women, greet a friend with a hug.

Space is important to Americans. When two people talk to each other, they usually stand about two and a half feet away and at an

angle. If Americans touch another person by accident, they say, "Pardon me." or "Excuse me."

Americans like to look at the other person in the eyes when they are talking. If you don't do so, it means you are bored, **hiding** something, or are not interested. But when you **stare at** someone, it is not **polite**.

Learning a culture's body language is sometimes confusing. If you don't know what to do, the safest thing is to smile.

Firstly, be polite. Always greet people in friendly manner. Begin your requests with little phrases like "Excuse me", "Would you please ...?", "Would you mind ...? "Remember to say "Thank you" when anyone has done you a favor. Secondly, be tolerant. Listen carefully when others are talking to you, whether it is interesting or not. Don't constantly interrupt other people. Moreover, never lose your temper, even if you are offended. If you do feel offended, try to talk to your friends frankly and earnestly. Thirdly, be considerate. Be ready to help your classmates, roommates, even strangers you happen to run across, whenever they are in trouble. Lastly, remember names. They say that the sweetest music to a person's ears is the sound of his or her own name.

If you can follow these suggestions, I am sure you will succeed in making many good friends,
