A lot of the practice material in this book is devoted to cumulative reinforcement of structures introduced in previous books. Each lesson groups together a number of related patterns or function words, which are then practiced in contrast.

This lesson focuses on time adverbials: when, while, until, before, after, since, for and during, and introduces the replacement of while clauses by gerund phrases. The lesson ends with a short conversation exercise on superlative forms.
