二、在学习英语的同时了解西方历史和文化

本丛书选取的是 8 位当代西方国家著名人物的传记,他们的成长历程,(如:普京、布莱尔,从一个平民孩子到一个大国领袖;罗琳,从一个贫困潦倒的女作家到当今世界上最成功的女人之一等)为我们了解西方的政治背景和社会环境提供了一个窗口。

三、对疑难词句进行了注解

本系列丛书,对疑难词句进行了认真的注解,并针对书中的内容设置了问题,提供了答案。使同学们在时间充裕的情况下可以进行精读; 也有助于单词量偏低的同学阅读顺畅。

四、有同步听力素材, 免费下载

我们还邀请美籍专家对精彩片段进行了录音,配套的音频产品可以 在网上免费下载。这是英语阅读类图书中的一个创举,有利于同学们阅读与听力同步提高,互相促进。


《高端人物》丛书,语言纯正,是集阅读、听力为一体的不可多得的好书,将对学习英语的青少年朋友们大有裨益。

INTRODUCTION

"We must provide for our nation the way a family provides for its children."

— Bill Clinton, first inaugural address, 1993

At age 46, Bill Clinton became the youngest man to be elected president of the United States since John F. Kennedy, who was elected in 1960 at the age of 43. Clinton was the first person born after World War II (1939-1945) to be elected to the nation's highest office. This made him the first member of the generation known as the baby boomers¹ to make it to the White House.

In his <u>inauguration speech</u>² on January 21, 1993, Clinton said:

When our founders boldly declared America's independence to the world and our purposes to the <u>Almighty</u>³, they knew that America, to endure, would have to change.

Not change for change's sake, but change to preserve America's ideals —life, liberty, the pursuit of happiness. Though we march to the music of our time, our mission is timeless. Each generation of Americans must define what it means to be an American.... We must do what no generation has had to do before. We must invest more in our own people, in their jobs, in their future, and at the same time cut our massive debt. We must do so in a world in which we must compete for every opportunity. It will not be easy; it will require sacrifice. But it can be done, and done fairly, not choosing the sacrifice for its own sake, but for our own sake.

Compassion, as always, was the key to Bill Clinton's policies.

Bill Clinton was the president of the United States, the commander in chief of the U.S. military, the leader of the Free World. One might think that Clinton was born in a rich family—with a silver spoon in his mouth, as they say—with all of the advantages that life can give. But nothing could be further from the truth. All of Bill Clinton's advantages were earned through hard work. He came from humble beginnings.

CHAPTER ONE

A BOY BORN IN HOPE

"My grandparents had a lot to do with my early commitment to learning. They taught me to count and read. I was reading little books when I was three."

- Bill Clinton

n the early daylight hours of August 19, 1946, William Jefferson Blythe¹ IV was born, one month prematurely², at Julia Chester Hospital in Hope, Arkansas³, population 8,000. The name on his birth certificate reads William Jefferson Blythe IV.

He was named after his father, who had been killed in a one-car crash three months before his son was born. The baby future president would be raised by his mother and his grandparents. When Bill was still a baby, his mother, <u>Virginia</u>⁴, met a local businessman named <u>Roger Clinton</u>⁵ at her father's grocery store. Roger's nickname was "<u>Dude</u>⁶," and he owned a car dealership in Hope. Two years later, Virginia Blythe moved to <u>New Orleans</u>⁷ for two years to study to be a nurse <u>anesthetist</u>⁸. She needed a way to support herself and her small son.

During that time, Bill stayed with his grandparents in Hope. Bill's grandfather's general store served both black and white people. There were not many stores in Arkansas during the 1950s that could make that claim. It was through his grandfather, who taught him to respect people regardless of their color or religion, that Bill learned his lifelong hatred of racism and bigotry⁹.

In 1950, when Bill was four, Virginia married Roger Clinton. From then on, Bill called Roger "Daddy," and that was how he thought of him. By first grade, Bill was known as Bill Clinton in school, although Roger, who was out most nights, never spent much time with Bill. Roger Clinton never officially adopted the boy either.

Donna Taylor¹⁰, who went to kindergarten with Bill Clinton, remembers him when he was five: "Some people like to be with other children. He was like that. He was always right there. Almost <u>obnoxious</u>¹¹. He was in the center of everything."

When Bill was six, the Clintons moved from Hope to

Hot Springs, Arkansas. When Bill was ten, Roger and Virginia had a son, Bill's half brother. They named him Roger Clinton Jr.

Going to Church Alone

Bill was religious as a child, even though his household was not. His grandparents had given him early training in the Bible, and later a devout housekeeper encouraged his churchgoing. At eight Bill would get himself up on Sunday mornings, put on his best suit and, carrying his Bible, walk the half mile to the Park Place <u>Baptist Church</u>¹².

In high school, Bill was an honor student and socially popular. He played the <u>saxophone</u>¹³ in a jazz band and was considered by many to be the best sax player in the city. He even competed to be named the best in the state. Clinton later wrote in a letter to a friend about his youth in Hot Springs: "No one ever enjoyed being kids more than we did—it would be pretty hard to crowd more living in."

Troubles at Home

His happy life at school, however, was countered by a not-so-pleasant life at home. Bill's stepfather was an alcoholic¹⁴ who became abusive¹⁵ when he was drunk. As
