The lesson introduces two-object verbs that can be used in alternative sentence patterns. Three patterns are labelled A, B and C as follows:

Pattern A: The indirect object follows the verb:

Philip gave his mother a present.

Philip bought his mother a present.

Pattern B: Indirect object with to.

Philip gave a present to his mother.


Pattern C: Indirect object with for.

Philip bought a present for his mother.

The verb + gerund pattern is also introduced and practiced in such sentences as:

I dislike getting up early.

The expression had better ('d better) is also introduced, and the lesson ends with a directed conversation exercise in which the new verb patterns are further practiced.



DIALOGUE: "A BRACELET OR SOMETHING"
