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Preface 前言

"剑桥双语分级阅读•彩绘小说馆"从剑桥大学出版社原版引进,是 "剑桥双语分级阅读•小说馆"的彩色升级版。"彩绘小说馆"由英美著名 语言教学专家及小说家合力创作,是专为非英语国家的青少年英语学习者 打造的分级阅读系列读物。

"剑桥双语分级阅读"丛书总规模 100 余册,其中本系列 20 余册,出版以来深受世界各地英语教师和学习者的喜爱,已有多个读本荣获英国 "语言学习文学奖"和"语言学习文学奖提名奖"。

"彩绘小说馆"具有以下突出特色:

它的故事均以青少年为主人公,从孩子的视角讲述那些充满冒险与挑战、幻想与新奇、开心与失落的故事,充分满足孩子的心理需求,使小读者在欣赏跌宕起伏的故事情节的同时不知不觉提升英语水平。

2. 它是专为非英语国家的英语学习者量身定制的读物,而非为英语母语者而写的大众读物。因此,本系列是中国读者首选的英语学习读物。

3. 它是英美知名小说家和英语语言教学专家合力创作的读物,小说家保障了读物的可读性与可欣赏性,英语语言教学专家保障了读物语言作为英语习得材料的科学性与可学性。因此,阅读本系列读物,我们会在欣赏小说的同时,自然而然地、有效地提高自己的英语水平。

4. 它的故事题材丰富多样,包括历险、悬疑、人文、奇幻、喜剧、历 史、戏剧等,读者可以随心选择自己喜欢的类别进行阅读;它的故事内容 生动有趣,故事情节引人入胜、扣人心弦,一旦开始阅读,就想一口气读 完,使阅读真正升华到"悦读"。

5. 随书附赠超值精彩 CD-ROM,内含单词练习游戏及剑桥原声真情朗 读录音。所配音频不是普通英语母语者的朗读录音,而是专业配音员的演 绎再创作。听着它,我们犹如在听广播剧、听评书,又仿佛是在听电影、 听话剧……这种聆听英语的享受将彻底扫除学生对英语听力的畏难心理。

6. 读本中所使用的语言,既有英式英语,也有美式英语,对应的音频 材料也相应分为英音和美音。读者可根据自己的喜好来选择。

7. 本系列读物根据"欧洲共同语言参考框架 (CEF)"和"剑桥大学外 语考试部 (ESOL)"的标准来确定级别划分,是建立在科学研究和实践基 础之上的分级。全套共分七个级别 (与中国读者英语基础水平的大致对应 关系,请参见图书封底表格),读者可根据自己的英语基础选择相应级别的 读本来学习。 为了更好地帮助读者学习和欣赏,"彩绘小说馆"在阅读理解、文化 扩展、词汇积累等方面进行了精心设计。

1. 增加适量辅助学习的内容。在章节中间设置了对页练习,包括 Looking back (前情回顾)、Activities (阅读活动)、Looking forward (情节 预测) 三个板块,重点培养读者的阅读理解能力与思维判断能力。还增加 了 Cultural note (文化点滴)和 Words & expressions (词汇与表达)板块, 帮助读者扫除阅读障碍,提升鉴赏能力。

2. 增加了小说全文的参考译文。出于语言学习的考虑,译文尽量采用 直译,保证两种语言句子的基本对应,避免文学式意译。值得一提的是, 所增加的辅助学习内容和参考译文,均由来自全国不同省市著名中学(包 括人大附中、北大附中、清华附中、黄冈中学、上海中学等三十余所中学) 的一线英语教师完成,从而确保了所加内容与中国学生的英语学习特点和 学习需求相吻合,为学生阅读和欣赏读物、提高英语水平给予恰到好处的 助力。

3. 提供配套网络资源。本系列读物配有专题网页,读者可以在网页 上了解读物的基本信息、故事梗概、作者和编译者介绍;可以通过"在线 测试"(http://cdextras.cambridge.org/Readers/RPT_last.swf)帮助自己确定 适合的阅读级别,再结合自己对题材和英式或美式英语的偏好,来选择具 体的读本;还可以进行故事预览和试听,下载录音和拓展习题,与其他读 者分享、交流读书心得。教师还可以分享教学经验并下载教案等相关资源 (http://www.blcup.com和 http://www.camstory.cn)。

英语阅读是英语课堂的延伸和补充,也是培养英语语感、提高英语水 平的有效途径。选择好的英语读物,收获的将不仅仅是语言的进步。欢迎 年轻朋友们来到"剑桥双语分级阅读•彩绘小说馆",打开一本本好书,品 味一个个好故事,为实现梦想搭建桥梁。
