I grew tired of meekness when I saw it without effect. Of late therefore I have been saucy, and in two papers, Rules for Reducing a Great Empire to a Small One; and, An Edict of the King of Prussia, I have held up a looking glass in which some ministers may see their ugly faces, and their nation its injustice. Those papers have been much taken notice of, many are pleased with them and a few very angry, who I am told will wake me feel their Resentment which I must bear as well as I can, and shall bear the better if any public good is done.

[Writing from Paris] I know you wish you could see me; but, as you can't, I will describe myself to you. Figure me in your mind as jolly as formerly, and as strong and hearty, only a few years older; very plainly dressed, wearing my thin grey straight hair, that peeps out under my only coiffure, a fine fur cap, which comes down my forehead almost to my spectacles. Think how this must appear among the powdered heads of Paris!

I am very happy in being at home, where I am allowed to know when I have eat enough, and drink enough, am warm enough, and sit in a place that I like and nobody pretends to know what I feel better than I do myself.

【富兰克林在巴黎所写的信件】我知道你希望见我一面,不过,既然见不到,就让我向你描述我自己吧!让你想像一下我目前的模样:我和先前一样开朗,身体也一样健壮,只不过长了几岁而已;衣着非常简朴,灰色的直发从我惟一的"头饰"——一顶品质极佳的毛帽——底下稀稀疏疏地冒出来。我的帽子通常戴得很低,遮住整个额头,帽缘几乎快碰到眼镜。想想看,我这副模样出现在所有人都光鲜亮丽的巴黎当中,该是怎样一个景象!

我很乐于待在家里,可以自己决定我是否已吃饱喝 足、是否穿得够暖,而且可以坐在我喜欢的地方,不 会有人假装他们比我更了解我自己的感受。 You desire me to send you all the political pieces I have been the author of. I have never kept them. They were most of them written occasionally for transient purposes, and having done their business, they die and are forgotten. I could as easily make a collection for you of all the past parings of my nails.

I have now been upwards of 50 years employed in public offices. When I informed your good friend that I was ordered to France, being then 70 years old, and observed that the public, having as it were eaten my flesh, seemed now resolved to pick my bones, he replied that he approved their taste, for that the nearer the bone the sweeter the meat.

And now I speak of thanking God, I desire with all humility to acknowledge, that I own the mentioned happiness of my past life to his kind providence, which led me to the means I used and gave them success.
