

The Committee calling the Meeting is taken as read.
The Minutes of last Meeting are read, confirmed & signed by
the Chairman, and passed for publication.

Departmental Reports — The following are submitted:—
Cash statement for past week
Report of Presidents apprehended
Police Duty Reports.

Nursing Home — The Council is informed of the result of a
personal inspection of the Home by Messrs Bayne and Dyer,
who profess themselves thoroughly satisfied with all the
internal arrangements and general management of the Institution.
Certain minor defects which came to their notice will
form the subject of a special report by the Matron, but
they are of opinion that there is nothing in the management
of the Home which calls for action by the Council.

No-
table Memorial Picture — Letter from Mr W.
Dunnison informing the Council that the picture of
Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, painted to his order for
preservation, to the Home has now arrived, and he requests
that it may now be placed therein in a suitable position.
The Council records its appreciation of Mr Dunnison's action
in this matter, and directs that a suitable reply be forwarded
to him for subsequent publication in the Minutes.

At Dogs — The Chairman alludes to a recent case of rabies which
has come to his notice, and in reference thereto it is decided
that instructions be given to the Police to shoot at once
any native dog found at large in the Settlement.

Public School — The Educational Committee's recommendations
on the subject of the Annual Grant in Aid are submitted
and, after discussion, it is decided to include the sum of £
10,000, asked for, in the Budget for 1902; at the same time
the Committee is to be informed that the Council disapproves
any idea of marking such sum an annual charge on the
public funds, and looks to the Committee to use every effort
by reducing expenditure and increasing the School's revenue
to make the institution self-supporting at an early date.
A further recommendation is made in the matter of provision
of books for scholars, which in the Council's opinion should
not properly be supplied from the public funds. It is
suggested

suggested that, while raising the general cost of education, a reduction might be more in certain cases to pupils whose parents are in bad circumstances, and in this connection the Educational Committee is to be requested to forward a comparative statement showing the number of scholars and the fees imposed during the past five years.

Mr. Kingouill's Petition Case — A letter by the Engineer

on the present position of the Council as regards U.S. Lots 827 & 828, registered in the name of Mr. Kingouill, is submitted. The alternative proposals for dealing with this matter consist either of awaiting the result of action by Messrs. Jardine, Matheson & Co's agents at the British Consulate, or of requesting Mr. Kingouill to submit the question at issue to arbitration. The Council decides in favour of adopting the former alternative.

Fire Department — A letter by the Secretary of the Fire Commission is read giving the names of the five gentlemen representing the different companies of the Fire Department who have won the Council's presentation cups during the past year.

Letter from the Fire Commission is submitted, intimating the re-election of Mr. L. Moore as Chief Engineer for the ensuing year.

Foshan College Dispute — The Secretary states that the General Consul has informed him unofficially that this matter will receive the attention of the Consular Body at its next meeting, and the Council will thereafter be informed of any action taken. In view of this communication, the Council decides not to avail itself at present to a proposal made by the Foshan's Secretary to send a Chinese emp[loyee] with a Sudario Deputy to interview the Kanshi Magistrate in regard to the question at issue.

Milich Monk Case — The Secretary is directed to see the British Consul on the subject of the case referred to in the Police report of the 1st December, in which, according to the report of Inspector Burke, one of the defendants, a silversmith, was treated with gross injustice.

The Council considers that action can only be taken in the matter should the Consul see fit to reopen it.

Principals — The Council receives at the request of the agents Mr. Shattock & Son, to instruct the P.M. to ascertain what are the

Council Clerks — The Council authorizes the clerks named in
the usual letter to the Senior Clerk for the Annual Election of
Councillors, viz. 24th and 25th January.

July 1st 1902 - Licences — The revised forms for licences of
W.
Furlockshaw - owner, foreign liquor sellers, and Restaurants in
approval by the Watch Committee, are submitted for the
Council's formal approval, and passed. It is noted with
regard to the two latter licences that under both categories here
after with the establishment of uniform fees, all foreign
concerns will be required to have their licences countersigned
by their respective Consuls, and all natives to deposit the
necessary amount of security in cash.

Agreement with Gas Company — The Council is informed that the
670 Directors of the Gas Co. are prepared to renew the existing agree-
ment for one year without modification, and instructions are
accordingly issued to prepare the document for signature.

Rifle Association — The Major Commanding having reported that
there is ample room in the Municipal Storehouse for storage of
the Association's ammunition, it is decided to leave the arrange-
ments in this matter in his hands.

Katyas Road Meeting - Cartashal £0 h 115 — The Engineers
report in connection with the building plan submitted on 21st
December by Mr. David Sisson, Sons & Co., points out that the
Building Regulations are not complied with in certain particulars.
After discussion and examination of the plan it is decided that
the rules applying to the erection of fire walls and ventilation
must be fully complied with, and the Engineer is to communicate with
the architect accordingly.

Gang Ring Pump Dock — The Chairman in the course of an in-
formal discussion asks the sense of the meeting for the
information of the Chairman of the French Council on the
question of the proposed filling in of this roadway. As
a result of this discussion Mr. Hardoon is requested to
intimate to the French Council that this Municipality is
not

The Minutes of the Works Committee are read and confirmed.

Dealing

Dealing with the question of the Extraordinary Budget, the figures, concerning those referring to Road Extension works, are discussed by the Council. The Financial Committee concur in the suggestion that the special expenditure on road works in the Western District should be divided into two applications of one hundred thousand taels each, and this amount will accordingly form the subject of a special resolution at the Annual Meeting of Stakeholders this year.

Reserve Garrison Hot-houses — It is decided to order the entire quantity of materials required for these buildings from home.

Engineer's Payments Book — The Chairman refers to the omission of the Works Committee's remarks on the subject of the Cemetery Lime-house and informs the Council of the facts of that case. Referring to the fact that the Committee disapproved of the erection of the present building on the 15th November, and that payment for the same is now entered in the Engineer's book, he enquires at what date the construction of the building was actually commenced.

Eurasian Cemetery — The Chairman explains the nature of the misunderstanding in the Engineer's office which has involved the Council in an unauthorized expenditure of over eleven hundred dollars. It is decided that Mr. Fair be made to be responsible to make good at least \$615, the amount of the debt for which amount he admits liability; and in the meanwhile no further assistance of any sort is to be rendered by the Engineer's Department to the Cemetery Trustees.

Protestant Cattle Taxation — Letter from the Revenue Office forwarding instructions of Shihai's Inspector on this subject is submitted, the Council regards it as unsatisfactory and decides that steps be now taken to carry out a suggestion recently verbally made by the Shihai's Bishopric viz. that one of the Bishop's Districts should visit the Northern District accompanied by an employee of the Council, to investigate matters on the spot and endeavour to arrive at some satisfactory settlement of the difficulty.

Storage of Ammunition — The Council takes note of an official communication forwarded by the Major Commandant ^{from}

from the War Dept., Office of the Naval Contingent, in which the Commandant of the Central Police Station, condemned as unfitly situated for the storage of live stock and powder, was generally as failing to comply with the military regulations drawn up for such buildings.

The Council refer the matter to the Watch Committee, understanding that the Major Commanding has been requested to forward, without delay, some practical and definite suggestions as to provision of a suitable site for a new Barracks.

Police Chinese Studies. — The Council is informed of the results of the recent examination of the Senior Police classes, conducted by the Secretary, results which on the whole, can only be regarded as unsatisfactory and such of a nature as to continue to justify the present bonus system. The Council agrees that a further examination, under similar conditions will be held on the 20th March next, and upon the results thereof the Watch Committee will decide what changes in tuition and bonuses, are advisable, unless distinct improvement is shown in the meanwhile. In this connection a letter from the Rev. Mr Ferguson, written in New York, is submitted, in which he expresses the hope that upon his return to Shanghai he may continue to act as examiner.

The Council decides that, having regard to the existing condition of affairs, it will be best to leave these examinations to be conducted by the Secretary in future.

Staff Nurse Instructor, Dizon. — The case of this employee, referred to the Council by the Finance Committee, is considered and it is decided that while inadvisable to make any further pecuniary advance to her Dizon, her case is a good one to be taken into consideration with a view of obtaining for parents in poor circumstances a reduction in the cost of education at the Public School.

As soon as the Educational Committee's reply to this point is received, the matter will be further considered by the Finance Committee.

Electrical Department. — On the result of an application from Mr Aldridge, the Council agrees that the slate in future be officially designated as Municipal Electrical Engineer, instead of "Subintendent".

Staff of M.C. Caterpillar. — Upon recognition of certain facts set forth by Sergeant Major Mack in the result of a misunderstanding which arose out of verbal communication to him from the Major Commanding the Council authorizes an increase in his salary of £ 10 per annum, calculated to compensate him for the amount to which he considered his self entitled from the date of embarkation at the Army Depot Office.

Bank Officer. — The Council having offered having reported that Tax Collector Committee is unfit for duty and should take leave of absence, the Council authorizes leave to this employe for 6 months on full pay with return passing in ordinary pay (Rate, 2^d Cler).

Co. Savings Bank. — Upon the recommendation of Mr Stanley the Council authorizes that the Inspectors of the Health Department shall be henceforward granted the privilege of depositing their funds in the Municipal Savings Bank.

Licensing of Hotels and Taverns. — The Council directs that it is submitted to those taken last year shall be adopted as regards to notification and procedure of the licensing of hotels and taverns.

Assault on Police. — Letter from Mr G. Wilson is submitted giving his explanation of the recent assault committed by himself on a Sikh Comptroller. After full discussion in this case it is decided to allow the summons against Mr George to be withdrawn, on the understanding that he pays £ 100 towards local charities and £ 50 contribution to the Sikh Society. It is decided to communicate with the

Colonel commanding the Beluchis Regiment, and to inform him that in view of the permanent nature of existing military & occupation of the Municipality will cause hereafter to pay on behalf of the hospital certain sum of expenditure hitherto defrayed for sanitary and other works out of Municipal funds on behalf of the foreign garrison.

Law Commission. — Letter from the Chairman of the Commission is submitted, intimating that the Native Military rules as revised and published are formally approved by the Commissioners.

Member for 1902. — Upon the motion of the Chairman seconded by Mr Baugé, it is decided to despatch Mr George McRae to be the Council's nominee on the Law Commission.

Commission for 1905; the Secretary is directed to convey this resolution to Mr H. S. Price, and to express the Council's hope that he will concur thereto.

Agreed Change of name — At the request of the residents in the Taik-hui-miao Road, the name of that street has been changed to Recanning Road. At the same time instructions are to be given for the substitution of a more convenient name in the case of the Sih King Lung-San Road.

Shanghai Volunteer Corps — The Major Commanding notifies the resignation, on leaving Shanghai of Captain Lanvin of the Customs Company. In accepting this resignation, the Secretary is directed to express the Council's appreciation of Captain Lanvin's services to the Corps.

Fire Department Cubil & Station quarters — At the request of the foremen of the Milk Colony and Refuge Companies it is decided to sanction the use of a portion of the recently erected quarters for foremen as mess rooms for these companies on the understanding that such rooms are free for at the same rate as the bed rooms.

The Meeting then adjourned.

Enforcement of Boundary Stones.

resolution of yesterday, no charge is at present proposed in the schedule or in the scale of taxation
of Boundary Stones. — In regard to the Council's
desire to bring a magistrate of prosecution of a man
being in default to comply with Legal Regulation No.
the Sheriff, under the Order now issued by the
British Consulate have given to the effect that it is
intended in the first instance that a magistrate shall be
issuing drawing the attention of local constables and magistrates
to the Regulation, and during a period sufficient for
so complete result in prosecution of the Council
authorizes the issue of such a notification on the understanding
that legal proceedings will be taken by magis-
trates to enforce the erection of boundary stones.

Vehicle Inspector.

Upon the recommendation of the
Watch Committee, the Council authorizes the hands of the
Vehicle Inspector and his duties to the Police Depart-
ment, it being understood that these duties will be
more effectively and usefully performed as the result of
such change.

High Road Cleaning.

The Watch Committee
having been informed that since the decision recorded on
this subject in the last Works Minutes, information has
been received to the engine to the effect that Mr. Whelock
properly will be used for the erection of Chinese houses.
An adequate offer based on the decision of the same
commission in the case of the Tidbury Road soiling, has
therefore been made to Mr. Whelock's agent.

Municipal Guard.

Correspondence relating to the proposed
appointment of Inspector Munro from the Home Office
to replace Mr. Bear, recently resigned, is submitted; after
discussion of the matter, in regard to which the Watch
Committee is divided, it is resolved to offer Mr.
Hawessey, the post of Gaoler under a three years agree-
ment on the understanding that the terms of his
engagement and the duties attached to the post will
be not other than those in Mr. Bear's agreement.

- Municipal Govt & Convict labour — Certain facts and figures
35 referring to the management of convict labour and the financial
results thereof for the Bush year having been laid before
the Council, Mr. Dingley proposes that the Secretary be in-
structed to write officially to Major MacKenzie and to state,
that in the council's opinion, the Bush and Present conciliation
of affairs is not to the general satisfaction, and the
management of the govt leave much to be desired.
It is more business-like supervision by the Sub-
intendant is necessary, and some opportunity is required for
regard to the unsatisfactory financial results of the labour
during the bush year.

- Election of Committee — Letter from Mr. Claypoole is sub-
mitted, written under instructions from a meeting of American
Baptists, in which the Committee is requested to nominate
Mr. H. F. Bell as the representative of the American
Community on the Council, for the ensuing year. Recd. to
the fact that a subsequent communication was received from
Mr. Bell, requesting that his name be withdrawn from the
list of nominees it is decided that an intimation to this
effect will be sufficient reply to Mr. Claypoole's letter.

- Mixed Court reform — Mr. James Hindley, Special Commissioner
for Great Britain, to negotiate Treaty revision, having
20 officially requested the Council to designate a Member for an
official to discourse with him questions relating to pro-
posed reforms at the Mixed Courts, the Council instructs
the Secretary to undertake this and send to afford Mr.
James Hindley all possible information on the subject.

- Shanghai Tolukhur &c &c — Hillery — Letter from the
Major Commissioner to Shantung forwarded communication
from the Office Commanding the Whaling Fleet which he is
requested that this may be divided into two sections
one to consist entirely of Whaling and the other of
Mafaine. The Council authorizes the proposed scheme

Ward. — A letter from the Rev. Mr. Turnbull, is enclosed, in which it is proposed that the Council should make provision in the Budget to acquire the vacant land adjoining the Hongkew Park, for the extension of that public ground. After the fact that the cost of this improvement may be estimated at from £7,000 to £8,000, and bearing in mind that the needs of the locality in question do not call for such a large increase in the open space as is now proposed, the Council unanimously voted that no action, such as is suggested, were to be taken, especially as a large portion of available funds is now being expended in providing recreation grounds in other directions.

Hanbury. — The Council is informed that the "Shanghai Hanbury Superintendents Ltd.", the successful tenders for £3,000 have intimated their intention of compensation for the concession, again.

German Officers' Committee. — The Council confirms its decision to authorise the Military parade, in honour of the German Emperor's birthday, to be held on the Bund here, but in view of the fact that no horses have been permitted on the grass on similar occasions in the past, the Secy. is directed to write to the Adjutant General that the Council desires that this precedent be followed.

Native Club. — With reference to an application by certain Rice Merchants for permission to establish a Native Club, under the usual conditions, a matter referred to the Council for decision by the Captain Superintendent. The Council records its general opinion that in all such cases permits should be granted as a matter of course, where the applicants are respectable people, and the proposed Club Building of a kind suitable for use by persons of good standing.

The Captain Superintendent proposed that a £20.00 closing hours clause be inserted in the permit, is approved.
