

At the General Meeting of the Council held in the Board-Room, No. 2, 3, & 4, King's Street, Strand, on Wednesday, the 4th January, 1877, at 11.30 A.M.,

The Committee calling the Meeting is taken down.

The Minutes of last Meeting are read, confirmed, signed by the Chairman and passed for publication.

Case Statement for the Past week, is submitted, and changes for sundry accounts are signed.

Return of Prisoners apprehended and Police daily reports for the past week, are submitted.

Quarterly Report — Health Officer's Report for October is submitted.

New Regulations. — The Chairman states that Mr. C. J. C. C. is of opinion that agitation in regard to the final passing of the New Regulations would be unprofitable while the Negotiations for Settlement of Discrepancies are in progress.

Mr. C. J. C. — Answer. — The Chairman also states that Mr. C. J. C. informed him, that he has received legal advice to the effect that his claim for passage might be enforced, that he had always understood from Messrs. Holliday and Shortburn, that it would be paid, and that there is precedent for such payment. The Chairman is in favor of allowing the Claim in reference to Mr. Holliday's promise, and after some debate

details, it is decided to give Mr. Cameron a second-class passage home for himself, his wife, and child provided they go within six months and provide his debt to the Council, for the Rifle Range Road frontage is liquidated.

Legal adviser's fee. — Memorandum by the Secretary has been circulated, on the subject of the pay and duties of this officer, resultant upon his interview with the other partners in Mr. Woodall's firm.

The proposal to pay an annual inclusive fee does not commend itself to the members, and the Councilmen point out that any interference with the appointment of Mr. Woodall, proposed as Legal adviser would involve consideration of the claims in respect of seniority of other local Solicitors, with this in view it is decided to offer Mr. Doree an increased fee of £2,500. per annum, the remaining Legal adviser as hitherto, with additional remuneration for attendance in Court, in return for which the services of his partners are to be at the Council's disposal, in addition to his own, when required.

Warrington Church. — The recent visit made by the Works Committee to Warrington has resulted in a difference of opinion as to the desirability of disposing of the Chapel land. The Chairman however points out that the Council's original object was to prevent encroachments upon the property, for which purpose the appointment of three trustees was decided upon; he is now of opinion that the Council may and should leave those trustees unhampered, dealing with the land in the way best calculated to fulfil the intentions of the trust. His proposal to definitely agree to the appointment as trustees of Messrs. J. & S. Scott, F. & G. Pearson, and Robert Hawkes Pott, is referred back to the Committee and carried on a show of hands.

Marketh Department. — The members are informed that no hitch occurred at the opening of the Market Hall, and that from both Markets £1,100 has

has so far been received for the month next.

The appointment of Police Sergeant Chapman as an additional Assistant Inspector is approved and it is decided that no alterations in the terms of Heriot & Christie's agreement shall be made until the 1<sup>st</sup> April next.

Name for Road. — Letter from the Register Bentley is read, suggesting that the name of Washington Road be officially given to the road S.E.R. Rail Way extension.

Decided that the present condition and importance of this road are not such as to render any name necessary.

Volunteers — Rifle Range — Letter from the Major Commanding is read, furnishing an account of the recent serious accident at the Range wherein a Chinese was shot. It is considered due to the Volunteer Scammon responsible for the accident that a letter be written to the Commissioner of Histories requesting that his position in that service be restored to him and in the meanwhile the Major Commanding is to be requested to hold an enquiry into the case and report to the Council thereon.

Police — Study of Chinese — The Intelligence Officer's scheme of instruction is sanctioned, and it is suggested that applications be made to St. John's College, Jessfield for the teachers required. Mr. Lambeth's remuneration for the work involved is left for the present in abeyance.

Municipal Insurance. — The Council's previous instructions on this subject viz., that enquiries be put forward through the London Agents with a view to placing all Municipal Insurance at home at better rates, is, before the recommendation of the Finance Committee, rescinded. The Schedule of proposed increases in the amounts of the various policies which has been circulated, with a draft letter to the Poor Co. is approved.

Plague Vaccines — Several numbers have been approached

rely themselves, by Mr. Muirhead, with a view to a withdrawal of the prohibition, decided upon at last meeting on this subject, and Mr. Muirhead proposes that the creatures in the laboratory at all events be permitted and that the prohibition apply only to the circulation of animals; the amendment however is carried that the Council adhere to its original decision.

Music Band — Letter from the Band Committee is submitted, and the recommendations therein contained in regard to engagement of new musicians are approved.

Public Lighting — The Gas Company's acceptance of the Council's offer to renew their contract for one year on the same terms is noted.

Trade Refuse — Report by the Engineer is submitted, drawing attention to the growing necessity for regulations on this score, and instance of Mr. Liddell Bros., the cost of garbage removal from their premises being nearly considerable sum. It is decided, to charge Mr. Liddell £30/- the cost of all removals of refuse not placed in the box on the roadside.

Engineer's Departmental Staff — The appointment of Mr. C. W. Ayre, as Surveyor of the Concrete Works on a salary of Rs 125/- per month is agreed to.

Finance Committee's Minutes of 10<sup>th</sup> January are read, and the Committee's recommendations therein approved, with the exception of that which refers to Police Troops; this question is left to be further discussed after enquiring into the subject by the Chairman of the Hatch Committee.

Native Warrants, & procedure for Arrests — Letter from the Senior Council is read, enclosing translation of a despatch received from the Shaohai on this subject.

It is noted that the Mixed Court Magistrate has been instructed to conform to the procedure suggested by the Consular Body. The Council considers it important that the Captain Superintendent of Police should prevent any City Magistrate's officers from making arrests without special authority.

Lotteries. — A letter from the Governor is read, enclosing a translation of a despatch from the Sadrai in reply to the Council's request for a proclamation forbidding the sale of Lottery Tickets by Natives. The Sadrai is in favour of the general suppression of this form of gambling but suggests that the sale of tickets in the Settlement is a matter to be dealt with by the Council. Decide to publish this correspondence with the Minister.

As the result of a discussion as to the practicability of immediately suppressing all native dealers in Lottery Tickets, it is decided that the Chairman will communicate the substance of the Sadrai's despatch to the German Consul General and ask for his co-operation in dealing with the matter. Mr. Anderson points out that if natives are prevented from selling tickets the immediate result, under existing conditions, might be to establish a lucrative monopoly for the benefit of German subjects, and to cause natives to open Lottery ticket offices just outside the limits of the Settlement. The members generally are in favour of adopting all possible measures for suppressing lotteries as far as may be done, and to publish a notification in the Native press to the effect that the sale of lottery tickets will be prohibited after 1<sup>st</sup> March. Final consideration of the question is postponed.

G.S.C. — Shooting accident at Rifle Range. — Letter from the Major Commandant is read, forwarding the finding of the Court of Enquiry held in regard to the recent accident caused by the act of Seaman Lewis at the Range. It is noted that this casualty was the result of carelessness on the part of Seaman Lewis and that stringent orders have been given in regard to the issue of ammunition at future firing practice.

German Company - Mr Commission as 1<sup>st</sup> Lieutenant is recommended to become the Captain Philipp, Vice Lieutenant  
17/18 Still resigned.

Recommendations approved.

Sharpage dues - This notice from our unofficial letter from Mr. Kocher that the final arrangements of the Customs for the new system of collections cannot be made until the terms of the Agreement between the two Councils shall have been officially communicated to the Commission -

The Secretary states that no communications can be received from the French Municipality in the matter until its new Council shall have assumed office.

Trade - Letter from the Horse Bazaar Co is submitted conveying acceptance of the new Agreement as finally arranged.

Settlement of claims - The Chairman informs the meeting of the present position of these negotiations which in the opinion of the British Council may be said to have reached a deadlock. He states that Mr. Brown has advised him, should the efforts of the Council continue without results, that it would be well for the Council to take the initiative by policing, training, or generally controlling the actions of these localities which afford the best arguments for the need of settlement extension.

The Chairman considers that such action, applied for instance in the matter of the Jessfield road widening or the suppression of gambling in Ki-Hong-Loo, would greatly expedite the negotiations. After a discussion of this suggestion, which does not commend itself as advisable to the majority of the Council, it is decided that the Chairman shall request the three Councils at present engaged in the negotiations to inform the Sardai that if no satisfactory arrangements are made, they will advise the Council to act in the manner above indicated. If the Council will take this step the Council can therefore proceed without incurring liability responsibility.

Taxation of Private Vehicles - The Chairman of the Finance Committee says that he proposes to lay before the next meeting of the Council an amended resolution for the taxation of private vehicles. The rates originally proposed

proposed were published, with a view to eliciting specific opinion in the matter, and he is convinced, that it is advisable to dispense with the taxation of Bicycles.

Settlement of Discrepancy. — The Chairman says that the prospects

of a successful issue resolution from the negotiations for this matter are hopeful; the Doctor's approaching visit to Hankow is expected to result in his being authorised to arrange for an expedition to include the bulk of the clause marked on the plan exclusive of Jassica and Pootung.

Lotteries. — The Chairman has seen the German Council on this subject but Mr Knutzen is still conscious of his inability to assist in the suppression of the sale of lottery tickets amongst his nationals. An anonymous communication, and a report by the Intelligence Agent are ready from which it appears that the Chinese are now selling tickets under cover of the "Chop" or signature of certain Germans. After considerable discussion, during which the Council's resolution to include this word "lotteries" in the proposed amendment of Bye-Law XXXIX is referred to; it is decided to address the German Council again on this subject in the light of the above developments and to ask him whether his prohibitions will be extended to Chinese making use of the above means of evading the proclamation, &c &c.

Propositions of Private Carriage. — The Chairman of the Finance Committee proposes as an amendment to the resolution originally adopted by the Council, that in order that this taxation, in its initial stage may not meet with opposition at the rate-payers meeting, the tax on bicycles be dispensed with and that the scale of fees in other respects be as follows:

For every private carriage in use 4/- per quarter.

— " — " pony. — " 1/- " — "

— " — " maniksha — 2.50/- — "

A discussion ensues as to the various times of carrying the tax. Mr Anderson proposing that one fee be charged so long as one carriage only is used at one time. Mr Taylor considers that a carriage or pony in use in any quarter should pay the fee for that quarter, and Mr Welch proposes a further amendment that

that for one payment any number of carriages or -  
bodies should be permitted. The majority of the  
members agree with Mr. Stogis and his amendment  
is adopted. Before further consideration the above  
decree are referred to H. J. & H. and A. respectively.

Recreation Ground Committee — Letter from the Hon. Secy.  
concerning submitting for approval four names for the  
Committee for 1897. In view of the approaching  
election of Councillors and to enable the Committee  
to find a suitable man to make up its full comple-  
ment — viz. five members — this question is postponed.

Volunteers — Accidents at Range — From a communication  
from the Commissioner of Customs it is noted that  
the dismissed employee responsible for this casualty  
has been reinstated.

The Council Versus Mc Murray — Letter from the Legal  
counsel is read, strongly advising that the permission to  
appeal in this case, on the terms that the Council pay  
£1000, towards the defendants expenses be availed of.  
The Councillors agree to this being done.


Legal advisories — Letter from Mr. Woodall is read

The Minutes of last Meeting are read, confirmed, signed by the Chairman, and passed for publication.

Case statement for the past week is submitted, and cheque for weekly accounts are signed.

Return of prisoners apprehended and Police daily reports for the last week are submitted.

Departmental Report — Electrical Department, &c., December is submitted.

Works Committee's Minutes are read and approved and in regard to the question of the plan of proposed new Roads and Extensions. In order to make due provisions for the extension of the lines of road laid down as means of communication in the Settlement the Council examines the map of Shanghai and determines what new lines of road are necessary and these and proposed road extensions and road widenings are laid down on the map and passed and approved. The map of the English Settlement (showing road widenings) is also submitted and approved.

Works Committee's Minutes are read and approved.

Charifice dues — The Secretary reads an unofficial letter from

from the Commissioners of Customs in which it is suggested, that in lieu of having a specific dues tariff to determine to calculate the amount of dues payable, it will be advantageous for all concerned if a levy of 2% on the Customs duties be made. This rate will, in the Rocker's opinion approximate to the recognised rate of 1/20<sup>th</sup> of 1% on market values, and the change will prevent the delay and inconvenience in passing cargo through the Customs which would necessarily be caused by the Specific Tariff procedure.

The proposal is unanimously approved by the Council; and the exceptions, by the opinion, will receive measure before which the amended tariff rates are to hold good, are noted. The Secretary is directed to communicate this decision to the Chamber of Commerce and to draft a resolution for the Ratepayers meeting in the above week.

The Insurance Association — Letter from the Chairman of this body is read informing the Council of two resolutions which were passed at its last meeting. The purport of the first is that the recent numerous fires in the Settlement call for measures for the heavy punishment of all proved incendiaries and the second suggests the appointment of a Special Committee of enquiry to examine into the best methods to be taken for the strengthening of the fire brigade. The Council fully agrees with the tenor of these resolutions and decides to address the Senior Warden in regard to the first question, requesting that a proclamation by the High Court Magistrate be issued warning natives that the severest punishment will inflict be awarded to all persons found guilty of arson.

With suggestions of the Clerk, Mr. Fox Amerson & Howell are appointed to serve on a Committee to consist also of two members of the Association; and the Chairman of the Fire Commission, to submit their recommendations to the Council on the subject of the Fire Department generally. The Secretary is

✓ Election of Councillors — It is understood that Messrs J. L. Scott & F. H. Fletcher have consented to act as Scrutineers and their names are approved.

✓ Thomas Fairbairn, School — Letter from the President enclosing a list recommending the names of twelve ladies and gentlemen to serve on the Committee for the ensuing year. The names are approved.

✓ Volunteers - Annual Inspection — From the replies to the Council's application it is noted that General Gascoigne will personally inspect the Corps on the 15th April next and that the usual appointment of two drill instructors will be made.

✓ Police — Application for leave for Captain Truman B. Co. who desires to attend a course of Military instruction at home is granted.

✓ Police - Civil Staff — Letter from the Colonial Secretary Hong Kong is read stating that Warden-McCormick from the Victoria Police is willing to take up the appointment of Chief Warden in Shanghai on the terms proposed by the Council. The appointment is duly authorised and the Secretary directed to telegraph to Hong Kong in accordance with the Colonial Secretary's suggestion.

The reasons for obtaining the sick leave required for the civil staff elsewhere than from Hong Kong are noted and

Mixed Court: The Captain Superintendent of Police is to be directed to levy of ablest men for this object locally.

✓ Contributions to Charitable Fund — Letter from the Mixed Court magistrate to the Captain Superintendent of Police is read requesting Police assistance in collecting subscriptions to such a fund. The Council after consideration holds that no such levy can be permitted to be made in the Settlements and the Secretary is instructed to reply in this sense.

✓ Fire Department — Letters from H.M. Office of Works are submitted in which a claim is made for rent for the Council's occupancy of a small piece of land behind the British Post Office by the Victoria Fire Company.

The question is referred to the Fire Commission.

✓ Huntington Home — Mr Anderson points out that the three Surveyors

Harris's agreements expire in September and upon his suggestion it is decided to enquire whether they are willing to renew them and if so upon what terms.
