

The Minutes of last Meeting are read, confirmed signed by
the Chairman and passed for publication.
Cash Statement for the past week is submitted and checked
for sundry accounts are signed.
Return of Prisoners apprehended and Police daily reports
for the past week are submitted.
Cattle in Police Dairies, The Inspector reports

that the cattle in 3 dairies have been infected with rinderpest, that 2 of the dairies are now closed, and the other, situated in Scott road is visited daily.

Markets — Report by the Inspector is submitted stating that during December the markets, and butcher shops were visited daily and the meat carefully examined. Beef and Mutton, have been in a abundant supply, and both of good quality, while Fish, Vegetables and Fruits have been fairly supplied at moderate prices, but for all descriptions of Game prices have ruled high.

The following animals have been slaughtered at the abattoir during the month. Oxen 1152, Sheep 2125, Calves 182, and pigs 177, on which the fees have amounted to £ 241, in addition to which there has been collected £ 1152, for branding Tongues and tails, £ 38.4, for writer supplies to grease shop men &c, £ 1.50 for special permits, and £ 32. for butcher licenses, making in all £ 2440.6, and the collected fees have amounted to £ 1013.65.

During the month, 1 ox, 4 sheep, and 3 pigs were rejected as unfit for foreign consumption and sold to the grease shops, of these 1 ox, and 2 sheep were slaughtered by licensed stall men for the markets, 8 lbs beef, and 10 lbs mutton were also seized and confiscated, and 3 oxen, and 3 sheep were rejected at the Slaught.

The animals brought to Pak Hien Jack, included 2040 lbs, 480 water buffaloes, 60 deer, Sheep, and 28 ponies. 35 Butcher Licenses, have been issued for January.

The Market in New King road was closed on the 18th December, in order to allow of the sheds being pulled down, preparatory for the building of the new market, and in the meantime a temporary market has been provided for the dealers in the Lloyd road where they now have their stalls.

During the month rinderpest appeared among the cattle in two of the Hong Kew dairies, and in one near Carter road. On the 20th December, at

In response of the Committee, the High Court Magistrate issued a proclamation prohibiting the removal of cattle from the infected trairies, & the Settlements, & since effects have been circulated amongst the trairies.

- ✓ Police Office 2. - The Inspector reported that during December he visited the different Trairies, & found the ponies in good health and condition, 374 had worn out ponies have been seen in the 150 trairies, and a few cases of glanders were reported at some private stables.

- Referring to Mr C. J. McQuade's resignation of the post of Chief Engineer, Mr Quinn suggested that he should be presented with a testimonial of some kind in recognition of his services, which he has rendered as an Officer of the Fire Brigade. Since it was first formed some 30 years ago, which is unanimously agreed to.

Some conversation then takes place about the
means to be used for this purpose, and the kind
of testimony which would be most acceptable to
Mr. Whalley, and Mr. Seaton undertakes to ascertain

Lighting Chang Foo Road, Letter from Mr. John
is read concerning the insufficient lighting of the
western end of this road, and stating that the light
given by the lamp at the corner of the Muoyong and
Chang Foo roads for some nights, has not exceeded one
candle power.

Letter to the Tao Company is also read directing
their attention to this complaint, and their reply
stating that the lamp referred to was found to be
defective on the night of the 28th Ult., and arrangements
were at once made to have it repaired, but
the interruption of the holidays has prevented the
work being completed.

Local Post Office - Mails for Outports, Letter
from the China Merchants Co. is read intimating that
on, and after China New Year, day the 2^d February
next, the Imperial Chinese Postal Service will come
into operation, and from that day it is steamer
will refuse to carry mails for Chinese ports, other than
those put on board by the Imperial Chinese post office.

Mr. Alford mentions that similar notices will be
sent by the different steamer companies, as a similar
arrangement has been made with all of them.

Some conversation takes place about the effect
this will have on the future income of the local
post office, and it is agreed that it will be necessary
to increase the rates of postage for local delivery.

Clark is read thanking the Council for his appointment

- Volunteers German Company. Another letter from Major MacKenzie is read enclosing one from Lieutenant Pickard asking permission to make certain alterations in the uniform of the German Company, which he recommends should be sanctioned, as of the 1st rank and file comprising the Company are recruits, and have not yet received any uniform and as they have had their uniforms for more than three years, and are entitled to new ones.

- 751 ✓ No Drill Shed. Another letter from Major MacKenzie is also read intimating that it is impossible to rent a godown for a drill hall for the training season, and suggesting that a matched 150×50 . should be erected, on the South foreshore of the Broadford Creek, which could be used for this purpose, Mr. Haze having intimated that he has no objection to the proposed shed being erected on the foreshore between the Anchorage and Flora road bridge, it is decided to approve of this suggestion, and the Engineer is to be instructed to have the shed erected there.
- 3 ✓ No Uniforms. Letter from Messrs. Law & Crawford Co. is read intimating that their contract for the supply of Volunteer Uniforms has expired, and asking whether the Council intend to renew it or not.
- The Secretary, having mentioned that Major MacKenzie recommends it being renewed for another year, it is decided to write to Messrs. Law & Crawford Co. to this effect.

✓ Cattle in Native Dairies. — The Inspector reports that
during the week disease broke out in the Bullion
dairy, three of the cattle are dead June 2 have
been sent to the Country. On the 8th, the owner
of an infected dairy was taken to the High Court
and charged with bringing a diseased animal into
the Settlement. He was ordered to have all his cows
removed to the Country by boat, and his premises
disinfected.

✓ Local Post Office. Letter from the Indo-China Steam Navigation Co. to Trade informing that on, and after the

establishment of an Imperial Chinese Postal Service,
they will be unable to carry the Local post mail
between ports in China.

✓ Wheelbarrow Tax. Proclamation by the
High Court Magistrate is read giving notice that
the Council intend to increase the wheelbarrow tax
to 60 cash in three months from now, as they do a

Le Kien Letter in the Settlement Report by the

- Chinese Superintendent of Police is read, stating
that a Le Kien office has been established in the
Settlement in an alley way off The King road, and
that on the 9th inst a runner came, and took to it 3
bales of feathers belonging to a German firm.

On this being reported to the Police the runner
and Manager of the station were arrested, and charged
and the feathers removed to the Saigon Station.

As Le Kien stations are not allowed in the
settlement it is decided to write to the Senior
Council and request him to bring the occurrence to the
notice of the Saigon Law, and to ask him to order the
removal of the station, and to give notice that no
feeling is allowed to be collected in the settlement.

Seward Road. Letter from Capt Fung, & Mr Bryant

- is read complaining of the state of Seward road, in
which there is no drainage from Sung Pui road East-
wards, and as the sidewalk is some inches higher
than the road, the water runs into it, where it remains
until it is incorporated, which is a danger to the

health of those living there. They add that if nothing is done to improve the road, they will be compelled to address their Consul, and to ask his assistance in order to obtain that to which they are justly intituled, that is, a decent road to their houses.

Decided to refer the letter to Mr Hague &c.

Entrance to Hong-Kong Creek - Obstructions. Report

31 from the Sanitary Inspector is read, stating that on the 11th. Inst., the entrance to the Hong-Kong Creek was blocked up by the steamers "Tea King" and "Lee Queen", which were moored across it, consequently the garbage boats belonging to the Municipal Contractor were unable to go to the dock-pilot, those already loaded were obliged to remain in the Creek, and a large quantity of garbage had to be piled up on the Seawall, and this has occurred twice within the last fortnight. He suggests that the attention of the Harbour Authorities should be called to this, so as to prevent it from occurring again.

In reply to the Chairman the Secretary says that Capt. Bishop, the Harbour Master is absent from Shanghai at present, but Mr. Cameron reported the occurrence to Capt. Cooker, who said that it is the duty of the River Police to see that the entrance to the Creek is kept clear, and that he would mention what had occurred to Mr. Mellows, and to Capt. Bishop so that steamers may be warned against mooring in such a way as to prevent boats from getting in, or out of the Creek.

Sheward Road. Report by the Engineer is read, referring to the letter from Capt. Flagg & Mr. Bryant, submitted at last meeting, and complaining that the part of this road about which they complain has never been resurfaced

31 ^{5/8} as there are only 3 foreign houses there, and very little traffic, and that the remelting of the other portion of Sheward road has been allowed to stand over for some time owing to the supply of granite chips being insufficient for the other roads. He adds that the remelting of the Bank has been postponed for too years for the same reason; but it is now ready.

done, as granite chips are arriving, he will however, allow the band to stand over, and get on with the Seward road at once, if the Council wish him to do so.

Decided to write to Capt. Flagg and inform him, that the Seward roads shall be attended to as soon as possible.

Shanghai Public School. Letter from Mr. Grattoo

covering his report on the School for the past year, thanking the Council for their support, and requesting that the Committee's recommendations respecting furniture and apparatus may receive favourable consideration.

Sile Forum Isolation Hospital. Letter from Dr. Bro.

Morrison Grattoo is read intimating that the unregistered portion of the land purchased by the Council was measured by the Chinese authorities on the 16th inst., and requesting that the sum of Rs 12,277.00 be now paid to the Surveyor as previously arranged.

I decided to send them a cheque for this amount, which will leave a balance of Rs 7,000, still to be paid, when the land is transferred to the Council.

Accounts for 1896, and the Budget for 1897. are

submitted. The Chairman says that the account for 1896 close with a deficit of Rs 113,000, and the Budget for 1897 estimates the expenditure at Rs 144,000 in excess of the income, amounting together to Rs 192,000. The deficit for this year is caused

by the large amounts expended under the head of Land & Buildings amounting to Rs 1147,000, which includes Rs 21,000 for the Hong Kew Park, the other land required consists of the Hill Rifle Range, the site for an Isolation Hospital, and for 2 District Police Stations in Hong Kew, all of which form very good assets so that he does not think that the rate payers will make any objections to the amounts expended. With regard to the budget, the accounts ought to balance, and a good many of the works recommended might be allowed to stand over. For instance Rs 6000, provided for a proposed new gate at the rifle battery, might be omitted, as it is not necessary to build the gate this year, and the other Rs 14,000, might be deducted from the amounts provided for drainage, laying out the range and other public works.

It is then decided to have the budget accepted as recommended, and to have copies printed and circulated,

The Meeting then adjourned.
