

### Introduction to the student

This book is for students who are preparing to take the Preliminary English Test (PET). It contains five units or practice tests. The first four are based on different topics: hotels, restaurants and accommodation; entertainment; sport and leisure; the media. These units will help you to learn and revise the vocabulary and structures which are covered in your coursebook. The last unit, which is like the 'real' PET, is *not* based on a particular topic. This unit can be used as a final practice test just before you take the examination.

If you work through this book it will help you to recognise the kinds of questions you will have to answer in the examination. There are four parts in each test: reading, writing, listening and speaking, although the oral section of the test is taken separately.

The book is meant to be used in class with a teacher but you can use it if you are working alone to practise the reading, writing and listening parts of the test.

If you are studying by yourself you will need the cassettes, which contain the recordings for the listening part of the test, and the Teacher's Book, which contains the answer Key for all the exercises and the tapescripts of the recordings. You will probably need extra help with the speaking part of the test, so ask a teacher or a native speaker to help you.

We hope that you will enjoy using the book (even if you don't finally take the examination). Good Luck!
