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## PREFACE

After devoting the whole of volume 50 to one decision—the Award in the *Rann of Kutch* case—we return in the present volume to the presentation of cases from a variety of international and national jurisdictions.

The decisions of the international administrative tribunals have been prepared by Dr. M. Akehurst, on the basis of reports kindly sent to us by the Registrars of the various tribunals.

The Australian cases have been prepared by Dr. G. Marston.

The English cases are the work of Professor Gillian M. White.

The cases from the Federal Republic of Germany have been communicated by Professor H. J. Schlochauer.

The case from Israel has been provided by Mr. P. Elman.

The Polish cases have been contributed by Professor K. Skubiszewski.

The decisions of the courts of the United States have been prepared by Professor Alona Evans.

The cases from other Commonwealth countries are the outcome of searches in British libraries by Mr. A. D. Watts of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

We thank these contributors warmly for their continuing and invaluable help.

We have to record with deep sorrow the death of Professor Edvard Hambro who was for many years a member of the Advisory Committee. To his wide experience in the field of international law—as a practitioner, an academic, a diplomat and a judge—he added great personal qualities of wit, charm, kindness and an ever-present readiness to help. He is greatly missed.

The change in the publishers of the series cannot go unnoticed. When the *Annual Digest* was started in 1929, the first five volumes were published by Longmans Green and Co. In 1938, Butterworth and Co. became responsible for the publishing arrangements. They have seen forty-five volumes through the press and are entitled to the appreciation of users of the series for ensuring the appearance of volumes even during the war years and for their initiative in reprinting volumes which had gone out of print. Certainly, they and their staff have earned the gratitude of the Editor and those who have assisted him for the help which they have given and the patience which they have shown over the years. Now the publication of the series has been taken over by a new firm specializing in international law books, namely, Grotius Publications Limited. We look forward to a long and productive relationship with them.
