We have to record with deep sorrow the death of Professor Edvard Hambro who was for many years a member of the Advisory Committee. To his wide experience in the field of international law—as a practitioner, an academic, a diplomat and a judge—he added great personal qualities of wit, charm, kindness and an ever-present readiness to help. He is greatly missed.
