### Preface to the Second Edition

Acronyms, initialisms, and abbreviations have become increasingly popular as a means of simplifying and speeding up both oral and written communication. Their use pervades not only English but nearly every other language of the world. As political, economic, and cultural interdependence among nations grows, so also does the demand for aid in deciphering abbreviated terms in languages other than English.

As a companion to the *Acronyms*. *Initialisms*, and *Abbreviations Dictionary* series, *International Acronyms*, *Initialisms*, and *Abbreviations Dictionary* (*IAIAD*) includes abbreviations used internationally as well as tens of thousands of terms local to specific foreign countries and, as such, not eligible for inclusion in *Acronyms*. *Initialisms*, and *Abbreviations Dictionary* (*AIAD*). As a result, overlap between the two publications is minimal and is limited chiefly to certain generic terms known worldwide ("Mlle" for Mademoiselle, "eg" for Exempli Gratia) and to internationally known organization names.

This second edition of International Acronyms, Initialisms, and Abbreviations Dictionary includes over 110,000 abbreviated terms. It cumulates all the entries from the previous edition and its two supplements and includes 5,000 terms appearing for the first time.

### Other Volumes in the Series

Abbreviated forms seem to proliferate as rapidly in foreign languages as in English. To keep users abreast of current terms, two interedition supplements (New International Acronyms, Initiai. ms. and Abbreviations) will be issued. In addition, a companion volume, Reverse I decide as Acronyms, Initialisms, and Abbreviations Dictionary, is available. In RIAIAD, terms are arranged alphabetically by the meanings of the abbreviations.

### What Is Covered?

The editors have cast nets worldwide in order to collect entries for this series. Over 150 countries are represented. The majority of terms are of current interest, but historical entries are also included.

The major criterion for inclusion is that a term be clearly international in scope or be continental, regional, national, or local to a foreign area. Because AIAD includes British and Canadian regions, they are excluded from IAIAD (unless they have international significance).

The range of subjects covered is virtually unlimited and includes societies, military terms, political parties, trade and commerce terms, labor unions, government units, nuclear energy terms, research centers, and thousands of commonly abbreviated words in nearly two dozen languages.

### **Expansion of Coverage**

Subject areas new to this edition include economic agencies, book publishing, scientific and learned societies, information services, trade shows, and music. Australian terms are also included for the first time.

### **Existing Entries Updated; Historical Entries Retained**

A new edition of *IAIAD* is prepared not only by adding thousands of previously unlisted terms, but by updating many entries from the previous edition.

Extensive editorial work is done to augment the entries in IAIAD. Many entries are enhanced by adding categories, geographic information, and cross-references to other entries.

For IAIAD-2, comprehensive updating has been done on the collection of international associations and research centers. Many terms have been enhanced by the addition of English translations.

When an entry is known to have become obsolete, it is not deleted but is merely noted or cross-referenced. Entries are deleted only when known to be incorrect.

### **Major Sources Cited**

IAIAD was compiled from a variety of published sources, miscellaneous newspaper and newsmagazine references, lists provided by foreign consulates, government publications, terms provided by outside contributors, and independent research by the editorial staff. Each term from a major published source is followed by a parenthetical alphabetic code in small capitals. For the user's convenience, a key to these symbols can be found on the end sheets. In addition, complete bibliographical information about the publications used is given in the List of Sources Cited following the Editorial Policies.

### Comments and Suggestions Are Welcome

Users of *IAIAD* can make unique and important contributions to supplements and future editions by notifying the staff of subject fields or languages that are not adequately covered, by suggesting sources for covering such fields or languages, and even by sending lists of terms they feel should be included.

### **Editorial Policies**

The rationale for compiling International Acronyms, Initialisms, and Abbreviations Dictionary (IAIAD) and the editorial practices followed in preparing it are much the same as those applied to Acronyms, Initialisms, and Abbreviations Dictionary (AIAD). These include collecting as extensively as possible in one reference the countless abbreviated terms that touch nearly every aspect of modern life worldwide; documenting and making manageable this dynamic "language"; and keeping criteria for inclusion broad enough that terms are not excluded on subtle technicalities.

### **Format of Entries**

A typical entry would provide the foreign abbreviation, its expansion in the foreign language, an English translation, identification of the language or country of origin, and a source code. Many entries, however, do not contain all these elements; the completeness of a listing is dependent upon the information provided by the source.

Many entries are without English translations, and others consist only of the English expansion of the foreign acronymalt is felt, however, that even partial information will be helpful to a user struggling through a multilingual jungle of acronyms and abbreviations. If additional information or a translation becomes available in future research, an entry will be revised.

### Capitalization, Special Characters, Transliteration

It was recognized at an early stage of compilation that complete consistency would be an elusive goal. *IAIAD* includes a multitude of languages, and sources vary in form and treat most of entries. As a result, most terms have been picked up exactly as given by the cited source.

It is common in English to write acronyms and initialisms in all-capitals and without periods, in part reflecting the limited capacity for character typesetting that marked the early days of the computer age. Periods have been eliminated from entries in *IAIAD*, but because conventions of capitalization vary widely from language to language, the capitalization of abbreviated forms has been preserved as given by the cited source. In the case of duplication, the all-capital form has been preferred.

Font limitations preclude the typesetting of diacritics, ligatures, and so forth. Where possible, however, affected letters have been altered according to accepted standards. (The German für became fuer, for example.)

Not surprisingly, various sources reflect differing systems or philosophies of transliteration. No attempt has been made to alter the original entries by applying a single system of transliteration. The potpourri of languages and sources represented makes complete consistency of treatment impossible. It is felt, however, that since *IAIAD* is aimed at a general audience rather than linguistic specialists, the simpler course will serve the needs of the general user satisfactorily.

### **Arrangement of Terms**

Acronyms, initialisms, and abbreviations are arranged alphabetically in letter-by-letter sequence, regardless of spacing, punctuation, or capitalization. If the same abbreviation has more than one meaning, the various meanings are then subarranged alphabetically, in word-by-word sequence. If an abbreviation uses an Arabic numeral, the term will follow other forms of the same abbreviation Roman numerals sort as alphabetics.
