# PREFACE

o death in history brought the world to a more abrupt halt than the assassination of President Kennedy. In Britain, Europe, India (where the editor was at the time), Australia and the rest of the world the sense of loss was as great as in the United States. For a time other events were trivial and forgotten, yet when the year is reviewed, as it is in these pages, much happened and much that was J. F. Kennedy's deep concern. As a tribute to him and his statesmanship the Year Book publishes in addition to an obituary notice quotations from his speeches made in 1963.

For many years now the London Book of the Year has looked on political events from vantage points of contributors all over the world. In this issue, with a replanning of the volume to suit more nearly the needs of readers in many countries, the treatment of general topics too is international. Gone, in the broader approach, are many separate and smaller articles of parochial interest. Articles have been regrouped yet space is still found for mention of the year's most talked of infant phenomena (in the plural of Mr. Crummles' phrase), the Beatles.

The Book of the Year also contains a series of special articles placed alphabetically throughout the text. These range wide from Addis Ababa Conference by way of Artificial Limbs (an exceptional piece), Cleansing Agents, Juvenile Delinquency, Programmed Learning, Shakespeare – with contributions by distinguished authors from many lands on the occasion of his 400th birthday – to World Food Programme. A full list of these titles appears on a nearby page.

Troubles the world had in plenty in 1963 and by the end of it there were many new leaders – Dr. Erhard, President Johnson, Sir Alec Douglas-Home, Mr. Lester Pearson included – to grapple with them. Silver linings were few, notably the Nuclear Test-Ban Treaty, but at least at Christmas breaches were made temporarily in the Berlin wall.
