PREFACE

This seventy-third annual issue of *The Ministers Manual* is the first for Jossey-Bass Inc., Publishers. It is clear to me that this publisher is committed to maintaining the quality and usefulness of the *Manual* that have characterized its record across the years. In addition, Jossey-Bass proposes to make this annual volume, if possible, even better. The publisher's scrupulous attention to the many details of my task as editor has made this task in some respects more difficult but more promising.

A productive conference with my new editor in San Francisco last year led to some changes that should make *The Ministers Manual* more useful. Section II reflects the most significant changes. The Lectionary Message for each Sunday is first rather than last, and, while it focuses on one biblical text, it cites the other readings for the day. Also, two illustrations follow each lectionary message. These illustrations are in lieu of a formerly separate section.

A new feature in Section II is Hymn Suggestions. In it, both classical and contemporary hymns appropriate to the season and often highlighting the Scripture lessons for the day are listed and annotated.

I wish to thank the many persons who make this book possible. Without their contributions, such a volume would hardly be possible. The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, where I have taught since 1959, has provided valuable secretarial assistance in producing the manuscript. The present volume was word-processed by Beth Beauchamp, with the assistance of Ja-Rhonda Staples and Linda Durkin. To all of these people and the authors and publishers whose works I have quoted and highlighted, I am deeply grateful.

White. Symbolizes purity, perfection, and joy, and identifies festivals marking events in the life of Jesus, except Good Friday: Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, Eastertide, Ascension Day; also Trinity Sunday, All Saints' Day, weddings, funerals. Gold also may be used.

Red. Symbolizes the Holy Spirit, martyrdom, and the love of God: Good Friday, Pentecost, and Sundays following.

Violet. Symbolizes penitence: Advent, Lent.

Green. Symbolizes mission to the world, hope, regeneration, nurturance, and growth: Epiphany season, Kingdomtide, Rural Life Sunday, Labor Sunday, Thanksgiving Sunday.

Blue. Advent, in some churches.

Flowers in Season Appropriate for Church Use

10 years (1988). February 24: U.S. Supreme Court overturns a lower court award to Rev. Jerry Falwell against Larry Flynt's Hustler magazine, finding free speech protections for parodies and satire involving public figures. April 25: Israeli court sentences retired U.S. autoworker John Demjanjuk to death for Nazi death camp war crimes. July 3: U.S. Navy shoots down Iranian passenger jet, killing 290. October 1: Mikhail Gorbachev consolidates power by assuming the Soviet presidency.

25 years (1973). January 22: U.S. Supreme Court decides in Roe v. Wade that states may not prevent abortions during the first six months of pregnancy. January 28: Cease-fire signed in Paris ends direct involvement of U.S. troops in Vietnam. May 8: Siege at Wounded Knee, South Dakota, ends as occupying Indians surrender under terms of cease-fire. June 9: Secretariat wins the Belmont Stakes by thirty-one lengths to become thoroughbred horse racing's first Triple Crown winner since 1948. September 20: Billie Jean King defeats Bobby Riggs in the tennis "battle of the sexes" in Houston. October 6: Arab-Israeli Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur) war begins in the Middle East. October 10: Vice President Spiro Agnew resigns and pleads no contest to tax evasion charges; Gerald Ford assumes the office on December 6. Debut: American League's designated hitter.

40 years (1958). May 31: France names Charles de Gaulle premier. September 29: U.S. Supreme Court speeds up integration of schools in Little Rock, Arkansas, in Cooper v. Aaron. Debuts: United Church of Christ and United Presbyterian Church in United States; John Birch Society; U.S. Civil Rights Commission; American Express card; Sweet 'n' Low: Pizza Hut.
