


















PREFACE

This BOOK is a sequel to my *Iraq: In the Eye of the Storm* (2002), which is structured thematically. In contrast *Secrets and Lies* advances chronologically, a structure dictated by the subject: war.

I have known Iraq and its people since 1978, when I first visited the country in the course of researching my book Inside the Middle East (1982). Since then Iraq and its former president, Saddam Hussein, have figured prominently in several other works of mine, including The Longest War: The Iran-Iraq Military Conflict (1989), Desert Shield to Desert Storm: The Second Gulf War (1992), and Neighbors, Not Friends: Iraq and Iran After the Gulf Wars (2001). To this list I need to add War Without End: The Rise of Islamist Terrorism and Global Response (2002), which, written after 9/11, contains a description of the Afghanistan campaign.

The skills and experience gained in chronicling the above wars have helped me shape the narrative of this book. They have also led me to point out affinities between seemingly disconnected or dissimilar events in this and earlier armed conflicts, thus lending the text additional weight and depth, while leaving its pace intact.

After a prologue—where I draw a parallel between the fates of Majid Suleiman, an Iraqi civil servant who was my minder in 1978, and his hapless country ruled by Saddam Hussein—I start my main text with 9/11 and the efforts made by the neoconservatives inside and outside the
