PREFACE

This volume represents a complete revision of bio-bibliographical material which originally appeared in Contemporary Authors, Volumes 25-28, published in 1971. The material is up-to-date, in most cases, through early 1977.

Following are answers to some frequently asked questions concerning revised volumes of Contemporary Authors and volumes in the Contemporary Authors-Permanent Series.

How much change is undertaken when past volumes of Contemporary Authors are revised?

Every part of every sketch is changed, if necessary. Present production techniques provide for fast, economical typesetting of all material used in revised volumes, and no attempt is made to minimize changes.

About 80-85% of all sketches in revised volumes have one or more changes from the original volume. The nature and extent of revisions can be seen by comparing the original listings for Steve Allen, Ring Lardner, Jr., and Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn with the revised sketches in this volume.

How are revised volumes prepared?

Clippings of previously published sketches are sent to authors at their last known addresses. Authors mark material to be deleted or changed, and insert any new personal data, new affiliations, new books, new work in progress, new sidelights, and new biographical/critical sources. Gale makes great efforts to encourage responses from all authors, and has a toll-free telephone number so authors can conveniently reply by phone without personal expense.

How do you revise previously published sketches if the authors do not return marked clippings?

First, every attempt is made to reach authors through previous home addresses, business affiliations, publishers, organizations, or other practicable means either by mail or telephone. If there is no reply, Books in Print and Forthcoming Books are checked for new works—and if a new work is found which is not already listed in the sketch, new requests for revision are sent to the authors through the new publishers. If the author still cannot be reached or fails to respond, work proceeds on verifying and updating the previously published information and adding to it where appropriate. Biographical dictionaries are checked (a task made easier through the use of Gale's new Biographical Dictionaries Master Index and Author Biographies Master Index), as are additional bibliographical sources, such as Cumulative Book Index, The National Union Catalog, etc. When necessary, a search is made to determine whether the author may have died. A number of sources are checked for obituaries, including indexes of various news media. In other words, all steps are taken which can reasonably be expected to confirm or invalidate previous information, or to provide additional information. Sketches not personally verified by the authors are marked as follows:

- † Research has yielded new information which has been added to the sketch
- † † Research has yielded no new information

Do all sketches in a revised volume undergo some change?

No, they do not. In a sense, however, every sketch in a revised volume is a "revised" sketch, in that the authors have examined them and indicated that the information they furnished for the previous edition is currently correct, or a revision editor has checked as many facts as possible and made the same determination. Obviously, previously published information which is verified as still accurate is just as helpful to the reference user as information newly added.

How much revision takes place in an average volume?

It is difficult to measure. Revised Volumes 1-4, for example, showed a net increase of about 70 pages, and Revised Volumes 5-8 an increase of 200 pages. These increases represented only the *net* change in the number of pages, however; they did not measure the *total* amount of change, since things like new addresses do not affect sketch length, and deletions of memberships or transfers of items from "Work in Progress" to the bibliography of published works usually result in decreases in space used.

Sketches of deceased persons and those presumed to be no longer actively writing have been removed from recent revision volumes and listed separately in *Contemporary Authors--Permanent Series*. Even with the substantial number of sketches which were transferred, however, recent revision volumes have been larger than the corresponding original volumes.

What is the rationale behind the Permanent Series?

Any biographical reference volume which is revised and republished over an extended period of time will grow to an unmanageable size unless it happens to be devoted to a class of person which is staid, inactive, and immobile. That certainly is not true of authors! Gale knew that revised volumes of CA were consistently larger than original volumes, and believed that future revised volumes would continue to grow. Therefore, it seemed reasonable to remove from the revision cycle those sketches which would not require revision in the future and to place them, after a final revision, in a kind of author's who was who (just as Who's Who and Who's Who in America).

Will the Permanent Series be continued?

No. The practice of removing deceased and inactive authors from CA, despite its clear advantages, also had unsuspected disadvantages, both for Gale and for users. A second volume of *Permanent Series* sketches is in preparation for publication by early 1978, but no further volumes will be published in the *Permanent Series*.

The two volumes of Contemporary Authors-Permanent Series include sketches of deceased authors and those no longer actively writing which have been removed from volumes 9 through 36. The Permanent Series volumes are an integral part of the Contemporary Authors series and will be kept in print along with all other volumes in the series.

Can any volumes of Contemporary Authors safely be discarded because they are obsolete?

When Volume 2 of the *Permanent Series* (to be published early in 1978) and Revised Volumes 33-36 (late 1978) are published, users who have the two *Permanent Series* volumes and all revised volumes published to that time will be able to discard the superseded volumes. Thereafter, an unrevised volume may be discarded each time a corresponding revised volume is published.

There appears to be an unusual number of biographical publications springing up, and the question is now often asked whether a charge is made for listings in such publications. Do authors listed in Contemporary Authors make any payment or incur any other obligation for their listings?

Some publishers charge for listings or require purchase of a book by biographees. There is, however, absolutely no charge or obligation of any kind attached to being included in CA. Copies of the volumes in which their sketches appear are offered at courtesy discounts to persons listed, but less than five percent of the biographees purchase copies.

Cumulative Index Should Always be Consulted

As always, the cumulative index published in alternate new volumes of CA will continue to be the user's guide to the location of an individual author's listing. Authors not included in this revision will be indicated in the cumulative index as having appeared in specific original volumes of CA (for the benefit of those who do not hold Permanent Volumes), and as having their finally revised sketches listed in a specific Permanent Volume.

As always, suggestions from users on revision or any other aspect of CA will be welcomed.
